REPUBLICANS GAIN IN PORTUGUESE ELECTIONS

Progressives Return 14 Members as Against Five in Last House—The Results in Detail. Lisbon, Aug. 31.—Complete returns from the recent parliamentary elections with the exception of such as were invalidated by fraud or otherwise, show the following results: Ministerialists, 90; Monarchists in opposition, 40; Republicans, 14. This is a Republican gain, the party having elected but five candidates at the elections two years ago. The Republicans charge extensive frauds and made frequent contests of the returns.

PLUNGES TO DEATH FROM PARK ROW BUILDING

New York, Aug. 31.—Crowd on Park Row, one of the city's busiest streets, stopped, horrified, today at the sight of a man's body hurtling through the air from the roof of the 26 story Park Row building. The body crashed into the skylight of the six story building adjoining and became jammed in the machinery of the elevator in the building. It was hardly recognizable and some difficulty was anticipated in identifying it. Surgeons who made a hasty examination said that the man had been instantly killed. No one seems to have seen the man go to the roof of the building and it was not known whether he fell from the dizzy height or deliberately jumped to his death. The victim of the fatal plunge was a well dressed man apparently about 45 years old. From papers found on the body it is believed to be that of E. H. Holbrook, an insurance solicitor, with offices on Broadway.

MANY ATTEND SCHOOL REOPENING AT HAMPTON

Hampton, Aug. 30.—A beautiful day greeted the teachers and pupils of the Hampton consolidated school on their reopening yesterday morning after the midsummer vacation. The principal, Mr. J. B. DeLong and his principal staff of teachers, met the children in the assembly hall and after the opening exercises Mr. H. G. Perry the former principal, now professor of biology in Acadia university, addressed the scholars on their new surroundings and the work they were expected to accomplish. Mr. DeLong introduced the new teachers and after the children had returned to their respective rooms, proceeded to transport them to the grades and departments for their term's work. There were 183 pupils present. The Rev. Geo. A. Ross, a former pastor, preached at both services in the Methodist church on Sunday. The Rev. H. B. Dickson, returned missionary from India, on home on furlough, preached in the St. John Baptist church on Sunday evening to a large and interested congregation, and in the course of his address gave a spirited account of the great congress recently held for the promotion of the Layman's Mission. Mr. Dickson is a native of Hampton Village, and resided here up to the time of entering upon his missionary study and work. Curtis Hicks, son of Mr. and Mrs. Allan W. Hicks, fell on the steps of the verandah of the residence on Main street, Hampton Station, on Saturday evening, and broke both bones of his left arm, just above the wrist. Preparations are in progress for the celebration of the centenary of the establishment of St. Paul's parish, Hampton, during the month of September.
