CHARLOTTE CO. EXHIBITION WAS COMPLETE SUCCESS

Total Attendance More Than Thirty Thousand—
Woodcliff King Wins Free-for-All and Bangor 2.14 Trot and 2.17 Pacing Event—Roy Volo Lame.

Syracuse, N. Y., Sept. 14.—The Get away Day programme of the Grand Circuit meeting here today was featured by several exceptionally good races and an exhibition mile against time by Butt Hale, who paced the circuit in 2.02 1-4, lowering his own amateur mark by half a second.

Abbie Dryad, driven by Geers, captured the 2.13 pace in two out of three heats. Poorman, the favorite, had the race won in the last heat but broke in the stretch.

The second race, 2.15 trot, was won by Echo Direct, Murray driving. Echo Direct was an added starter. His mark now is 2.08 1-2. Jess Y. McDonald, up, had a walkaway in the last two heats of the 2.08 trot, while Lord Lyndon won the 2.30 trot for three year olds in two straight heats. The 2.30 trot found the entrants finishing in the same order in both heats. Lord Lyndon, Litt Todd, First Virginian, Louis Guy, Litt Todd fought hard at the finish in both encounters. Brown, driven by Graves, closed the card by taking the 2.13 trot in two of three heats.

William Bishop charged with selling liquor to the "joy riders" was remanded in order that his counsel might have time to make arrangements for the defence of his client.

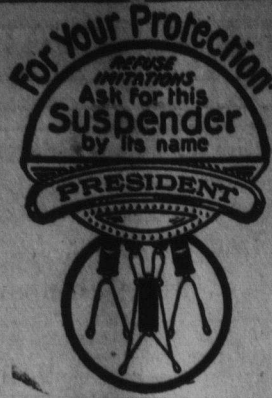

This is the first occurrence of its kind in many years in this city.

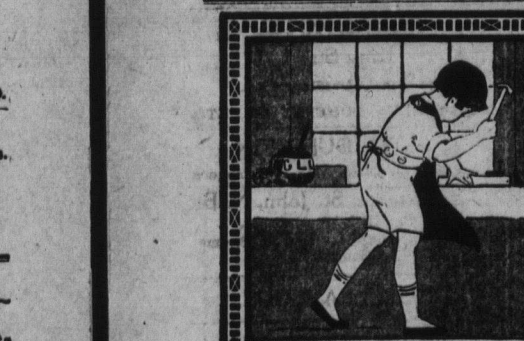
