THE WORK OF WAR SAVINGS SOCIETIES

To promote the systematic saving of money by groups is the purpose behind the War Savings Society. Experience shows that people through combination often do better work than they do individually, the individual resolution being strengthened by that of others.

Ten or more persons may organize themselves into a War Savings Society. A charter is issued by the National War Savings Committee to each such society, this being official recognition. Once formed, effort is directed towards popularizing saving and inducing as many persons as possible to buy War Savings and Thrift Stamps.

Organizations such as the Daughters of the Empire, Red Cross Societies, the Women's Grain Growers, Home Makers' clubs and fraternal and benevolent bodies generally should form War Savings Societies in their own midst. Schools, factories and large business concerns should do likewise. There is no expense in connection with the work. It costs nothing and pays well.
