

Man is killed

65-year-old Downsview man was killed early Thursday morning when his car (foreground) was struck broadside by a second car on Dixie Road north of Britannia Road. James MacArthur was pronounc-ed dead at the scene. Lynda Haines, 29, of Bramalea; the driver of the second car was taken to Peel Memorial Hospital with a concuss

later released. Police said MacArthur's car was travelling north on Dixie Road when it crossed the centre line, went out of control and was struck broadside by the Haines' car. Investigators had not yet determined why MacArthur's vehicle went into the oncoming lane. Road conditions were wet at the time of the accident
