

of the determination of a Liberal government to act upon the principles of investigation.

To these might be added the many amendments to the criminal code as a means of coping with social, industrial, and commercial evils, as well as with what might be more definitely described as criminal practices.

In the face of a record of the kind, to speak of the Liberal party as a party of laissez-faire, is to proclaim oneself woefully ignorant of existing legislation on social and industrial reforms, or of a deliberate determination to misrepresent for party ends the position of a political opponent.
