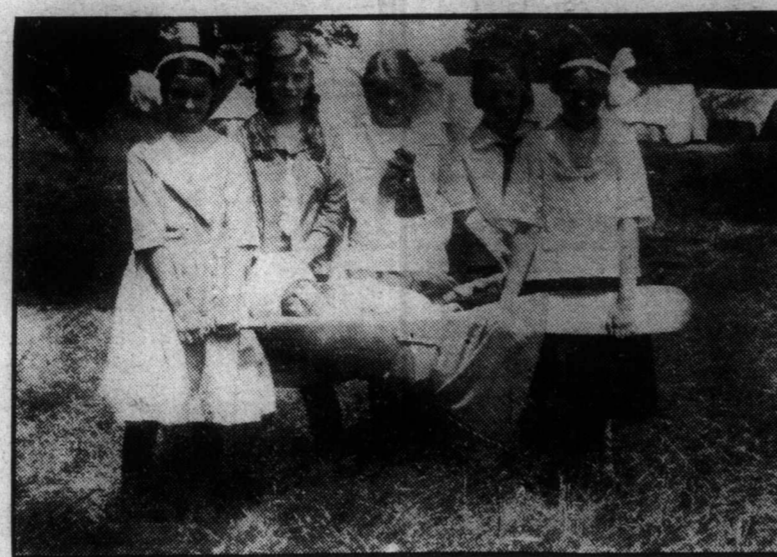
To Make Girls Useful and Self-Reliant is Object of the Association--Phases of Work Outlined--"Be Prepared" is Their Motto.

The emergency stretcher, constructed from whatever is handy, such as a coat, skirt, petticoat or blouse.

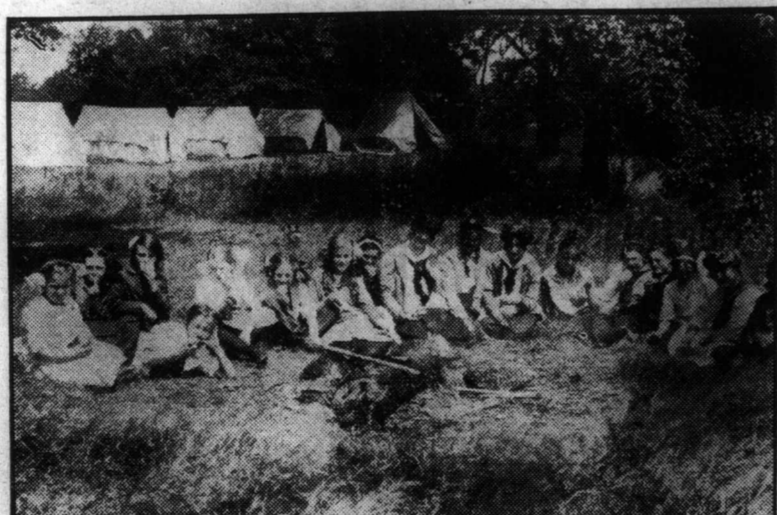

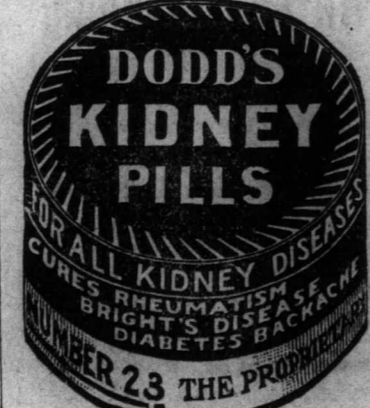
A camp-fire scene at the dinner hour of Brantford Girl Guides.
