Troubles of  
Chief Finch

Resignation is Culminat-  
ion of Two Years of  
Rough Going.

GUELPH, April 13.—Fire Chief  
Leslie G. Finch has tendered his resig-  
nation. The resignation is the cul-  
mination of the troublesome times of  
the past two years at the fire-hall. It  
is understood that the chief intends  
to bring actions for unpaid damages  
against the City of Guelph and also  
against certain individuals. He claims  
that ever since he came to Guelph he  
has not had a fair chance, and that it  
has been impossible to make any  
headway in the department. An in-  
vestigation into fire-hall matters was  
held in 1912, and the chief was exoner-  
ated from blame. The investigation  
was, however, a farce, the evidence  
being unsworn. A few weeks ago five  
of the permanent men walked out,  
and charged the chief with showing  
favoritism by recommending one man  
an increase in wages and leaving out  
the rest. The chief alleges that this  
walk-out was incited by certain mem-  
bers of the City Council. The chief  
contends that all the trouble he has  
had since coming to Guelph has run-  
ned his reputation as a fire chief, and  
he has been forced to seek other  
means of livelihood, this being the  
basis of the action he proposes.

The inspector points out that had  
all stoves chimneys, plumbing, etc.,  
been in proper shape and individual  
purifiers installed where necessary,  
there would probably have been little  
complaint, but none of these things  
were done, the gas being turned in  
quite without warning. "As soon as  
the Tilbury gas was turned on," he  
says, "complaints came from every  
direction that it tarnished silver,  
blackened picture frames, killed house  
plants, spoiled wall paper, and caused  
headaches and severe coughing fits,  
if not serious illness, etc., in short,  
that it was most disagreeable and un-  
satisfactory in every way and shape."

Bears Out All Charges

It will be seen that the report of  
the inspector after full investigation  
bears out all the charges that were  
made when the matter was first  
brought to the attention of the Gov-  
ernment by Messrs. Weichel and  
Fisher and later by the deputation of  
Western Ontario members that wait-  
ed upon Hon. W. G. Weichel. Inspector  
Lambe adds that the description  
of conditions in the Brantford district  
applies with equal force to those in  
Hagersville and Jarvis.

Proceedings to deal with the question  
of a remedy for this state of affairs,  
the inspector points out that the Do-  
minion Gas Company announced that  
it would build a purifier to take care  
of all the gas and expected to have it  
ready in three months. Later they  
telegraphed that it would be six  
months before any purification could  
be done. Further inquiries are now  
being made to learn just what the  
company intends to do and pending  
that finding no action is likely. Re-  
ference is made to the Brewster bill,  
now before the Legislature, which  
proposes to give power to any mun-  
icipality to prevent not only the dis-  
tribution within its bounds, but even  
the transmission of gas containing  
sulphuretted hydrogen.

As to the ultimate remedy for the  
conditions the inspector's report says  
that nothing much can be done until  
the success or otherwise of the pro-  
posed purification plant for Brantford  
district is demonstrated.

"If successful" he says, "I should  
form permanent colony satisfactory  
to everyone, and it will then be in  
order to consider to what extent pur-  
ification should everywhere be fur-  
ther enforced than at present, for it  
cannot be gain-said that to the major-  
ity of consumers a purified gas, or at  
any rate, one containing not more  
than a limited amount of sulphuretted  
hydrogen, would be somewhat pre-  
ferable to an unpurified one, price  
and other conditions remaining the  
same. On the other hand, for certain  
uses, such as under boilers or in gas  
engines I can see no advantage what-  
ever in purification.

"If the process be unsuccessful, as  
is freely predicted, by many, then  
about all that can be done will be to  
make regulations governing the types  
of apparatus in which different gases  
may be used the conditions of plumb-  
ing, etc.; in fact, I would recommend  
that these latter questions be attend-  
ed to in an case. Further I would  
recommend that in so doing two sepa-  
rate acts be compiled, one for nat-  
ural gas and one for manufactured  
gas, as their constituents being so dif-  
ferent the apparatus in which they  
are used, so often of such opposite
