A poultry house that combines many A poutry house that combines many advantages is built with an open shed on the south, with tight roof. The house proper should have a warm, dry roosting and laying apartment, arranged so as to afford good ventilation when needed and yet avoid a direct draft.

The cellar is no place for poultry. While it may be uniform in temperature and may protect the fowls from severe cold, as a rule the cellar is damp, and the result usually ends with roup. There are few cellars that are perfectly dry, and poultry houses are to be preferred on this account.


