#### Friends' Convention Ended.

Toronto, Aug. 19.—The closing session of the Friends' General Conference was held vesterday morning and the delegates, numbering nearly 1,000, in the afternoon begar returning to their homes. In the speeches that concluded the convention the meeting in Toronto was characterized as the "best ever held." "Purity" was the subject for the last day. The discussion was opened by an address on "The Pure in Heart," after which a series of interesting papers was read on the factors that make for pulity—the home, the school, the press and the Church. "Individuality in spiritual and social life," was the subject of a fine address by Prof. Adam Shortt of Queen's University. Kingston.

Ottawa, Aug. 19.—Prof. W. F. King is now sailing on the steamer Danube, north, to inspect monuments already placed along the Alaska boundary line. He is accompanied by O. N.
