TOILET HINTS.

Frequently Change the Way of Dress-

ing the Hair.

Always dressing the hair in exactly the same way is apt to make it thin in places, and the constant wearing of a frame to raise the hair from front and sides is also liable to thin it where the wire presses the head. It is wise, therefore, to change the style of dressing for a day or two now and then, dressing it low in the neck to give the hair at the top of the head a rest from constant pressure of pins or frame. Never, if you value your hair, sleep with it dressed as you wear it in the daytime. Always take it down and comb and brush it well, plait it in a loose plait, and let it hang down. Do not fix it by pins during the night.

Complexion Cure.

The latest cure for a thick or spotty complexion is to wash it with parsley water. Take half a pint of rain water and soak in it a large bunch of parsley, letting it remain in the water all night. In the morning when you dress rub the face well with a dry cloth, then dip a sponge in the parsley water, and pass the damp sponge over your face, leaving it on without drying it. Do this three times daily, and at the end of a fortnight you will be sur-prised to see that there are no more spots or roughness on your face.

When the face is tanned by the sun. bathe it with water in which lemon juice in the quantity of a tablespoonful to half a pint of water has been added.
For finger nails that are tender and loose do not use the nail file or orange To clean them, soak the finger tips in warm olive or sweet oil, wash thoroughly in warm soapsuds, using the nailbrush lightly. If dirt still re-

mains under the nails, remove with a piece of old linen.
Orris root powder dusted over the hair is a good substitute for frequent shampooing. Sprinkle the powder into the hair and rub it well into the scalp, then brush it out. Hints For the Hair. There is a right and wrong way of brushing the hair as there is of doing everything else. First, part down the center above the forehead and give it twenty brisk strokes on either side. Divide it down the back and repeat the same process. Next brush it back

from the ears, giving it always the twenty strokes. Persevere with this treatment and your hair will soon become soft and glossy and repay the trouble taken with it.

A good shampoo for dry, falling hair is made as follows: Shave half a cake of white shaving soap and dissolve it in a pint and a half of hot water, add thirty grains of potassium carbonate, 120 grains of powdered borax and two ounces each of bay rum and best two ounces each of bay run and best cologne. Wet the head well, then rub with this shampoo all over, cleaning the scalp with the tips of the fingers, rinse in several waters, the last cold,

and dry thoroughly.
