ASK HIS RECALL

Meddling Ministers Cannot Stand Exposures of Political Intrigue by "Foreigner" Dundonald

Ottawa, June 12.—The flat of the Government goes forth. Lord Dundonald must go. The Cabinet met yesterday and considered the situation and came to the conclusion that the dispute has reached such a point that there is no alternative left but to ask for the General's recall. Lord Dundonald in the meanwhile has announced that he has not resigned and has no intention of resigning. Unless something intervenes, he will leave for London, Ont., to attend the camp of military district No. 1, and then he will go to Niagara.

Ministers are very reticent over the episode, and it is said no official announcement of the Government's decision will be made for a few days.

It is hoped in the meantime that public opinion will calm down.

Communications, it is said, have already been forwarded to the Imperial authorities.
