To the Editor of THE ACADIAN.

DEAR SIR:—I received your paper containing letter which I asked you to publish, and desire to thank you for same. I herewith enclose \$1.00 for which kindly send me your paper for one year.

I would like to say a few words to you as follows: The day I arrived home from Canning I was called upon the 'phone and asked to go to Centerville, Digby county, 16 miles from Digby Gut, to raise up and haul out the Str. Centerville, that went ashore at that point. I started with my ton of gear at once, raised the steamer 1 1/2 ft. high, and moved her up the beach 70 feet, clear of tides and sea. It was considered by the owner and others to be a very difficult job; it required good engineering to handle the steamer; she was badly leed up, a nasty sea running at high tide, and right open to the bay of Pundy. The job was completed without a hitch or the slightest accident and the owner, A. Bouteiller, Esq., was very pleased with the job. I have handled a good many stranded vessels since I commenced to follow the business, and have been exceptionally successful. I was offered a few weeks ago the contract to move a brick building in P. E. I. and the size of building is 50 by 50—3 stories high—to be moved 100 feet.

I don't take backwater from any man in Nova Scotia or New Brunswick for handling buildings or vessels. I don't say this to boast of, but I have the record to my credit.

To the Point.

There is a condition of things prevailing in Wolfville (and other places as well), but that does not concern us, which is very detrimental to the best interests of the town. The citizens of Wolfville pay the merchants about fifty thousand dollars annually for handling goods, and they are not doing the work for which we pay them; for a very large share of the trade goes to the foreign department stores. But the lady, selfish, grasping, uncharitable merchant will say, 'what can we do?' The answer is do not try to sell everything and in the end not sell much of anything. Some of our merchants here should put up some sign as well, that is John Brown, grocer and undertaker, dealer in groceries and all other vegetables, biscuits, canned goods, fish, collie bags and gowns, tungsten lamps, wallpaper, drugs and other country produce, also a large assortment of nails, paints, dry goods and other notions too numerous to mention.

We so frequently hear a merchant say, 'but you can't get the merchants to agree on anything.' That means that the particular merchant who is speaking is a hog and would not be willing to have his neighbor sell anything that he could handle. It just means that the local merchant must awake to the trend of things, or his will close. This is written with the hope of awakening an interest in the town's business welfare and not to call up any personal abuse. If there is any occasion for that, I presume there are several secluded back yards in the town available for the purpose.

Can you not agree with me that the band will never be brought up to a creditable level until those playing are rewarded for their services. They are the people of Wolfville will not take more interest in the band, give it more support, and see that it is run properly, we can hope for something better in the near future.
