

THE TROUBLES IN IRELAND.

LONDON, Oct. 15.—Mr. Forster, Chief Secretary for Ireland, declining an invitation to a banquet at Armagh, says:—"The first duty of the Government is to maintain law and order; but no Government ought to seek exceptional legislation until it has exhausted its constitutional powers."

A Dublin correspondent says:—"The Crown law officers at the consultation yesterday drew up a form of summons against the Lord Leagues agitators, to be issued before the higher authorities for approval. The Privy Council under the presidency of the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, has also considered the matter. The Government is not content with striking at subordinate."

All four prisoners in custody on suspicion of being concerned in the murder of Lord Mountmorris were liberated today. The only witness examined at the managerial enquiry was unable to identify any of them as persons he met on the night about the time the murder was committed.

A Dublin correspondent says:—"It is now conceded that a break has been created between the priesthood and the Lord Leagues which will soon widen into a complete rupture. Under the Archbishop McManis, who has been in the country, the priests in the Province are always anxious to conciliate the heat of the metropolitan diocese and its prominent members. The clerical element will entirely disappear from the League platform.

A crowd of people assembled last night in the village of Craughwell, in Galway, and burned the effigies of two bailiffs who had made themselves especially offensive. No attempt was made by the authorities to stop the proceedings.

New York, Oct. 15.—The Herald's Dublin-despatch says the presentation of the Lord Leagues leader which has been in the hands of the Government has caused a panic in their ranks, as they did not imagine the Government would dare to take such action. Boston, Oct. 15.—The Pope has summoned some Irish Bishops to Rome to instruct them in view of the present state of affairs in Ireland.

Queen's University, Kingston.

The ceremonies in connection with the opening of the new buildings of Queen's College were continued on Friday by the installation of the newly-elected Chancellor, Mr. Sewford Fleming, C.B., and in the evening by a conversation, when the Chancellor received a large number of his friends. Each of these ceremonies was attended by a large number of people, and the whole day's proceedings were in every way successful. At a meeting of the Senate Rev. A. B. Nicholson, B. A., was appointed assistant professor of History. It was left to Principal Grant to appoint another gentleman to assist Mr. Nicholson until the chief professor is appointed. The Principal has decided to appoint Mr. Samuel Woods, M.A., of Toronto University, as interim lecturer in Greek. The installation of the newly-elected Chancellor, Mr. Sewford Fleming, C.B., took place in the afternoon in presence of a large assemblage. After being duly installed the Chancellor delivered an able address. The Registrar then read a minute of the Senate to the effect that they had resolved to confer upon Rev. D. Macrae, of St. John, Moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Victoria, Australia, the degree of Doctor of Divinity. In the evening a cordial and pleasant and successful conversation was held in the new building. The attendance was very large, and during the whole evening every room was thronged. Addresses were given by Rev. S. S. Nelles, D. D., L. L. D., President of Victoria College, Cobourg; Mr. G. H. Smith, M. A., of J. J. Clark Murray, L.L. D., of McGill College, and Dr. Jaques, President of Albert College.

The steamships of the fortnightly line between Baltimore and Liverpool, sailing at Halifax and St. John's, will continue as per present arrangements.

Completion of Cologne Cathedral. COLOGNE, Oct. 15.—The festivities attending the dedication of the cathedral ended at two o'clock this afternoon. The weather, although of a threatening aspect in the early part of the day, continued fine. The Emperor and Empress, with sixty-five princes and high official dignitaries, signed the document which was placed in the capstone of the tower amid the singing of many societies, the firing of cannon, and the cheers of the spectators. The procession of the Kaiser, the Emperor, and the Empress and Princesses from the south portal of the cathedral across the square to the imperial pavilion was most picturesque. Three hundred school children sang a choral during the procession. The total absence of Catholic clergy from the outdoor ceremony has been much commented upon. The Te Deum was sung after which the Imperial procession crossed the cathedral and the Emperor delivered a short address. The popular enthusiasm is remarkable. The Emperor, in his address, thanked all the German Governments for their co-operation towards the completion of the cathedral and concluded as follows:—"May this splendid monument remain in the grace of God as a promise of peace in all lands."
