GROWTH OF TOBACCO INDUSTRY

essed a remarkable development in he Canadian tobacco industry. There prone to shrug their shoulders and refer in contemptuous terms to Canadian tobacco. Today, there are thousands of smokers whose favorite in Essex County, Ontario, or in Quebec. The choice which may in the first place have been prompted by necessity, in time becomes a genuine preference. The development of the Canadian tobacco industry is indelibly related to the customs tariff. Twenpractically all the tobacco used in Canada was foreign-grown, imported either in the leaf or manufactured form, while the production of raw ported leaf. It was under the encouragement thus afforded, according to a witness before the Tariff Comtobacco and cigar manufacturing 551,684 pounds in 1896 to 5,572,687 pounds in 1908. The amount of foreign raw leaf taken for use in the same factories advanced only from ten million odd pounds in 1898 to fifteen million odd pounds in 1908. The import duty on foreign leaf was increased from ten to twentyeight cents per pound in 1908 with the result that the amount of Canadian tobacco taken for use in the Canadian tobacco and cigar factories still further increased from 5,572,037 to 10,848,-385 in 1914. The import duty on foreign leaf was advanced to forty cents per

pound in 1918, and in 1919 the production of all Canada amounted to about twenty-two million pounds. Estimates for this year place the production of burley tobacco in Essex and adjacent counties in Ontario between 19,000,-000 and 20,000,000 pounds, with between 1,500,000 to 2,000,000 pounds of tobacco of the Virginia type. In Quebec, this year, the crop is estimated at about twelve million pounds, all of the cigar type. Thus it seems that the Canadian tobacco crop
