HARTLAND PROUD OF HOME GUARD

On Monday and Thursday evenings the shrill notes of the military bugle announce the assembling of the Hartland Home Guard for drill. This takes place in the Armory and Capt. Howard Adams puts the company averaging from 30 to 50 each evening, through movements that are both beneficial to the physical and the military well-being of those who have come forward to make preparations for doing their part in the protection of the homes, and the women and children of Hartland in the possible event of a raid by enemies of the Empire from points "over the line."

On the nights above mentioned citizens residing along Main street have their attention attracted by the military tread of men and the curt command of the officers in charge and haste to windows or doors to see a body of well set up young and old men in military uniforms, with rifles at the "stop" marching along the street and reminding them that possibly this may be only a portend to what may happen unless the allies are successful in crushing the mailed fist of the tyrant, William of Germany, who orders prayer to be offered to God for the success of the herds of his murderous, butchering, sacrilegious soldiers. Those who have connected themselves with the Home Guard are enthusiastic in their training and are making commendable progress as civilian soldiers and movements on Monday evening were done with a promptness and precision that could well be emulated at the annual camps which are held at Sussex. If the Hartland Home Guard were put in competition with many of the companies which assemble there they would come home with honors.

Aside from the duty of every male in the population of Hartland to be prepared for any untoward event which the present war may force upon us, the drill is a benefit in discipline and physical development. The present nominal strength of the guard is 50—one ordinary company. This number should be doubled, so that Hartland, if occasion required, could turn out 100 trained men to defend those in the place who look to our manhood to protect them against any foe.

This Conservative Opinion Should Have Weight.

Mr. Dugal, M. P., and Mr. Carvell M. P., will be entertained at a banquet to be given Friday evening, Dec. 3rd, in Fredericton, in recognition of their good work in having exposed the crookedness in provincial affairs. On Friday there will be a conference to consider the policy to be pursued in respect to provincial matters of importance. Some Conservatives, disgusted with retention of a convicted corruptionist in the Local Government, may unite with the Liberals in considering what should be done.

The situation is serious. The lumber lands have been locked up for a long term in the hands of a few corporations, and the province has become liable for millions of railway debt. Its share of the railway receipts will not pay more than half of the interest on this debt, and the revenues already insufficient to meet the ordinary demands upon it, will be drawn upon for the other half.

If public men, alive to the critical position of the province, would lay aside party feeling and consider what is to be done, a remedy might be found. But while we are cursed with leaders who are ready to build railways and manipulate the Crown lands for the purpose of carrying constituencies and retaining office, we cannot hope for reform but must look forward to still further indebtedness.
