THE U. S. ELECTIONS.

Attention of the Continent Directed to the Giant Fight in New York City.

Tammany Fighting for Its Life Against United Attack of the Fusionists.

SHARP CONTESTS IN OTHER STATES.

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—Election day in this city dawned clear and bright, with not a suspicion of cloudiness, ideal weather for getting out a heavy vote, and the early morning polling was especially heavy, not only in Democratic strongholds down town, but in the uptown districts, where the Fusionists are strong. In these districts, long before the polls were opened, voters stood in line waiting, many of them prepared to enjoy a day's outing and carrying golf sticks and lunch baskets, ready for departure. The voting was extremely rapid.

Mayor Low voted early, going alone to the polling place in Park Avenue near Sixty Fourth Street, where the William Devery was one of the first to vote in his district, being in line before the polls opened. George B. McClellan waited until later in the forenoon, walking over to his polling place and casting ballot No. 121 in the district with no delay, the early rush being over. He then took a street car down town to his headquarters.

It was quiet during the early hours and every precaution was taken to keep it so during the day. More than a thousand policemen were temporarily transferred to provide the necessary officers in each district. During the night twenty men suspected of being thieves were arrested and they will be held at the police headquarters as a precautionary measure.

Arrests for alleged illegal voting began early. Eight arrests in Manhattan and two in Long Island city were reported during the first hour. Senator John C. Fitzgerald, Timothy D. Sullivan a successor at Albany, was arrested to-day in the polling place of the first election district of the sixth assembly district, on complaint of Civil Officer Brewster, a Republican watcher, charging him with disorderly conduct.

BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 3.—In every city and town in Massachusetts, elections are being held today for all state and county officers and members of the Legislature. The campaign has been one of the hardest fought in the history of State politics. Early the voters began to appear at the polls. The campaign managers of both parties had instructed the district leaders to get the vote out as early as possible and there was activity towards this end.

BALTIMORE, Md., Nov. 3.—Every voting place in the 308 voting precincts were crowded when the polls opened today. The indications point to a very heavy vote in the city as well as in the counties of Maryland.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Nov. 3.—There was not the usual outpouring of workers of either party to get out voters early. The Democrats are more apathetic than the Republicans, as they realize that the normal Republican majority of nearly 100,000 cannot possibly be overcome.

COMMON MOTIONS

Before Supreme Court—Ex Parte Thos. Hayes—Milligan vs. Crocket, Etc.

The following common motions were made before the Supreme Court this morning: Ex parte Thos. Hayes—J. H. Barry, K. C., moves for rule absolute for certiorari and rule nisi to quash a conviction made against Hayes by the Police Magistrate of Fredericton, for third offence against Canada Temperance Act. Motion was made on ground of improper reception of certificate of first two convictions, the certificate being furnished by the magistrate trying the complaint for third offence. Rule refused.

Charles J. Milligan vs. James H. Crocket—O. S. Crocket moves for rule nisi for an attachment against Thomas O'Hilland for contempt in disobeying a subpoena to attend and give evidence as witness in behalf of defendant on the trial of this case at the St. John Circuit in June last. Rule nisi granted, returnable next term.

Ex parte George Gilbert—C. N. Skinner, K. C., moves for rule nisi for a mandamus to compel John E. O'Brien, a Justice of Peace of Gloucester Co. to issue an attachment in the matter of complaint of King vs. one Ronald for violation of the fishery law. If this case the Minister of Marine resulted p. nally and costs. Mr. Skinner contends that the Minister had no power to do this. Rule nisi, returnable next term.

Ex parte W. Frank Tait—(2 cases.) Geo. W. Allen, K. C., moves for rule for certiorari to quash two Scott Act convictions for first offences against Tait upon the ground that Walter Cahill, having been appointed Police Magistrate of Sackville, he thereby and under the Town Incorporation Act, ceased to be Stipendiary Magistrate for Westmorland, in which capacity he tried the cases in question. Rule nisi.

GOLFING TOURNAMENT.

Toronto Receives a Visit from the Lady Champion.

Six Days Play to be Indulged in.

Splendid Weather Greets the Enthusiasts This Afternoon.

TORONTO, Nov. 2.—This week, beginning today at two o'clock, will see what will undoubtedly be the greatest gathering of lady golfers ever assembled in Canada. The occasion is the presence of the British champion, Miss Rhoda Adair, as a guest of Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Austin. She will play all during the week in the Lambton links. In addition to the large local contingent some sixty ladies will play in the tournament. All the important clubs will be represented by their leading golfers. It is beautiful golfing weather to-day, not chilly and too warm. The dew was heavy, but as play will take place in the afternoons only, the links ought to be in excellent condition.

WESTERN CAPITAL.

Indignation at Granting of Liquor License at Norwood.

WINNIPEG, Nov. 3.—According to the Winnipeg vital statistics for October, the births number 102, deaths 99. Arthur Stevens, manager of the Canadian Farmers Health Society, says that the organization has already arranged for the placing of 5,000 British men and women either as agricultural help or to be settled on farms.

Residents of Norwood, a suburb of Winnipeg across the Red River on the St. Boniface side, came in a body, after an indignation meeting, to Hon. Robert Rogers, minister of public works, last night, and avoiced him out of bed to hear the formal protest against the action of the License Commission in giving a permit to sell liquor in the village. Mr. Rogers promised consideration. There is considerable excitement over the granting of the license and violence is threatened.

Were Not Intoxicated.

The young men who were arrested on Sunday morning claim that, although they were allowed to go upon the payment of the regular Sunday drunk deposit, they were placed under arrest for Halloween pranks and not for intoxication.
