CUBAN REBELS VICTORIOUS; GOVERNMENT TROOPS REPULSED.

The Battle in Pinar del Rio Province is Regarded as Important.

Havana, Aug. 25 .- To-day's early advices from Pinar del Rio and vicinity indicate that the outcome of the exbattle between the Government oops and the insurgents under Pino Guerra is more in doubt than the officials at the palace are willing to admit. Guerra is believed to have nearly or quite 2,000 men who can be depended upon. They are reported to be well equipped with arms and ammunition. It is sus-pected that the insurgent leader's with-drawal from San Lais and San Juan drawal from San Lais and San Juan was a ruse to attract the Government troops from their base at Pinar del Rio. A sudden descent upon Pinar del Rio, in the event that Palma's troops do not take an early offensive, would not sur-prise those seemingly well informed. The city has less than 1,000 armed defenders, and the strength of the civilian loyalty is in doubt.


