Dear Sir,—I believe the new School Act is causing a good deal of trouble in many parts of the Island, where the people have heretofore been careleas in not having their districts defined. This part of the trouble should properly be thrown on the former Act, for certainly it is requisite that the bounds of each School District blould be properly defined and registered; and if the people cannot agree among themselves; and are not willing to abide by the magistrate's decision, they should not pick holes in the Act, in this respect. Every settler cannot expect to have a School within 100 yards of his door; and, therefore, each neighbour should learn to use brotherly kindness one toward another. But I believe, the people have greater cause of complaint in not being able to obtain Teachers, and it is thought that many, very many Districts, will be without a Teacher altogether. This is owing to the smallness of the remuneration for the Teachers' services. I do not mean that a larger sum should be taken from the Revenue, but that the Act should enable the people to assess themselves for a farther sum to obtain the services of a good Teacher, and give him power to recover the settlement should wish to give an additional sum for a superior Teacher, he has to trust to the honor of the people, as he is, I believe, precluded from recovering it by Law.
