The authorities charged with the
development of aviation do not
do not plan any world flight at
present.

The Government is wholly un-
interested in sporting events and will
offer no prizes to encourage pri-
vate initiative and efforts. The
policy of the air ministry is to do
everything in its power to promote
airship transportation between En-
gland and Canada, India and
Australia believing that dirigibles are
best suited for long distance and
planes for short quick hops.

Airships now flying can carry suf-
ficient gasoline to cross the Atlantic
and get back again without refuel-
ing and experts are now discussing
the possibility of a round the world
flight without alighting, refueling
directly from vessels by means of a
hollow mast which will serve the
dual purpose of anchor and filling
tube.

ALLEGED HUMBUG IN UNEMPLOYMENT TALK

The ministers who were respon-
sible for calling the unemployment
conference at Ottawa must feel al-
ready that they made a mistake.
Practically all that was said cal-
culated to damage their cause in a
political sense. The Socialist
Labor speakers found fault because
the Government had not done
enough or had not done it
soon enough. The employers con-
demned the Government's fiscal
policy as a cause of the problem
they were assembled to consider.
There is considerable humbug in
the unemployment talk. There
should be in Canada no need of
national conferences on the subject.
The present gathering seems to be
more the result of officials' and
meddlers' activities than of any in-
dustrial collapse. There is some
slowness in trade and transportation
and it has its effect on the demand
for labor. Wages have not been
seriously reduced. They are so
high in some trades that they
tend to reduce the amount of
work. In connection with building
between increase in pay and reduc-
tion in hours of labor it costs
two or three times as much to
build a house as it did twenty
years ago. That and the increase
in taxes not only makes rents high
but decreases the ability of men to
build. The men who get as much
for a week's work as their fathers
did for a month's should be able
to care for their families during a
dull period which they know is com-
ing. There are in the country, how-
ever a lot of people who think
they are social reformers, and who
spend their time considering ways
for making the community respon-
sible for the individual deficiencies.
One type of labor leader, who is
represented at the conference aids
in the propaganda of helplessness
by promulgating demands that
not the worker individually, but
the taxpayer generally shall be
provided in time of slowness.
Every winter of late the same out-
cry is made by the same sort of
people. Canada is a cold climate,
and for a term in the winter many
outdoor employments are retarded
or stopped. The men who go in
to the woods do most of their
work in the winter and would laugh
at the idea of the weather being
too cold for them to go on with
their operations. The woodsmen
however, are a superior class of
men physically and morally. All
are not of their type and their
type is not a subject for socialis-
tic care. It is a complaint of
those in charge of construction work
in some parts of the country at
least, that when the mercury sinks
below the frost line many whom
they would employ throw up their
jobs and move into the cities.

There are cities which have the
name of being easy. Socialistic
talkers and administrators who rose
as friends of the people create a
sentiment that makes it safe for
the out-of-work, incidental or pro-
fessional to count on a warm sleep-
ing place and a meal. There the
unemployed gather and sometimes
become a danger. Work is not
what they want most. Some of
the western cities had an experience
with them that is enlightening.
Edmonton provided for the unem-
ployed until the burden began to
gall, and anybody big and strong
enough was told he must shift for
himself. When the choice of the
unemployed was between getting
work and starving nobody is report-
ed to have starved. The Dominion
may well learn from this expe-
rience. The purpose of most of the
municipal and labor representatives
who spoke at the conference was
to get the government of the
Dominion to take over the
charge of providing for the unem-
ployed either by providing direct

relief or by instituting public works
that may not be necessary and
are sure not to be profitable. It is
an alarming prospect that opens to
the taxpayer if the ideas advanced
at the conference are adopted by
Parliament. First, it means a
heavy and growing draft on the
Dominion treasury and the creation
of a costly administrative machine
to disburse the amounts. It also
means the spreading of the idea
that Canada has reached the limit
of its expansion; that it no longer
offers opportunities to the toilers
and that one of its Government func-
tions is to care for people who can
not get work and care for them
selves.

ROLL THEM UP

Take off your hat, roll up your
sleeves and go to work, because
the men who do not work in some
form or other are unknown. No-
body likes them and the busy world
does not even know they are here.
The men who are able to live the
rest of their lives without work
are the men who have worked
the hardest at one time in their
lives. Men die sometimes and it
is said that it is from overwork,
but that is seldom the case; it is
generally from over worry. Work
gives an appreciation of holidays
and it gives an appetite for meals
and a soundness of sleep. Most
people in this old world have to
work and there are a lot of us
alive yet.

WHEN CLOTHES WERE CHEAP

A correspondent has sent to the
editor of the Ottawa Citizen a
price list of a Toronto clothing
firm, Thos. Thompson & Son
which was discovered in a maga-
zine dated 1884. Nothing can
more strikingly illustrate the shrink-
age of the dollar in forty years.
Here are the items on the price
list: Boy's tweed overcoats 98 cents;
boy's tweed suits 98 cents; men's
sealotte overcoats \$2.50; men's
fine tweed overcoats \$4; men's
Irish blizzard overcoats \$6.50;
men's fine worsted overcoats \$7.50
men's serge suits \$3.50; men's
tweed suits \$6.50; Boy's tweed
pants 25 cents; men's tweed pants
\$1. If such prices corresponded in
other commodities a man could
live pretty comfortably on \$10 a
week. And one can understand
now how grandma and grandpa
could afford to get married on \$8
a week.

TEN MILLION CIGARETTES SEIZED

A few days ago the Customs of-
ficials at Brockville forwarded to
Ottawa about ten million cigarettes
of American manufacture, which had
been seized at that point.

That large quantity was collected
in the space of a little over two
months.

Those best informed on the sub-
ject claim that there are from five
hundred million to seven hundred
million cigarettes smuggled from
the United States into Canada annu-
ally, replacing an equal quantity of
cigarettes of Canadian manufacture.

The seizure made at Brockville
during the past two months would
seem to indicate that this esti-
mate is, if anything, below rather
than above the mark.

Five hundred million cigarettes
brought unlawfully into Canada re-
presents a loss in tax to the Dom-
inion Government of the huge sum
of \$3,655,000.
