

The op-tion market showed an advance of 1.8 to 1.2. Commercial grades for November and December delivery ad-vanced 1.2 to 1c. The cash demand for spot was good, and flax 3.1.2c up. Chicago was 3.8 to 5.8 higher for December and May and 1-8 for July. Corn was fractionally lower all round Chicago oats declined 1-8 to 1-2. Minheapolis was off 1-8 to 1-4. There are in sight for inspection 325 cars and the weather is reported fair over the wheat provinces and much milder tem. 
