Of course the prevailing idea here is that some valuable addition be made to the city with this \$50,000 so generously donated, but very many outside St. John's are of opinion that to immortalize the present head of the firm of Bowring Brothers and several of the past ones, a few light-houses, fog alarms or life saving stations would be very appropriate; because of the firm's interest in the country's shipping this idea is likely to have the approval of the head of the firm at the present time. Hon. E. R. Bowring, whose benevolence, generosity and kindness prompted the gift. Should this suggestion be acted upon and each light-house or other aid to navigation be named after one of the several heads of the firm the immortalizing would be complete, and the benefits of the benefaction evenly distributed.
Seeing the interest taken in the seamen of this country by the firm of Bowring Bros., the necessity for additional aids to navigation, more particularly on the South and West Coasts, and that by the adoption of this method the greatest good would come to the greatest number; our seafaring people stands to benefit largely by this very generous gift.

The Portia Arrives.

The s.s. Portia, Capt. T. Fitzpatrick, arrived here at 1.45 a.m. Wednesday. It is not often that the general Captain Tom shows the searchlight of his ship, but threading his way through so much shipping in the harbor, the electric rays were necessary to prevent accidents. The ship left here on the 22nd of July at 10 a.m., and in a dense fog anchored at 11 that night at the entrance of Trepassay. She remained there 2 a.m. Sunday and had the fog very thick to Marystown, where she arrived at 6 o'clock next morning. The ship was at Hermitage Bay Tuesday morning in a dense fog and remained all day; reached Ramea Thursday at daylight, and left Port aux Basques Friday morning. The ship left Bonaventure Bay in the afternoon of the same day and had a good deal of foggy weather coming along the coast right to port. She brought a good deal of cargo and some passengers.
