

Ciapp moved the adjournment House on Wednesday, after the spension of the Rules of the House munication by telegraph with the principal men at Bonne Bay who were crying out about the unsatisfactor carriage of the mails to that part of the District for the past ten weeks He referred to a telegram which h had received and about which called upon the P. M. G. who stated that the Reid Nfld. Co. were to blame for that particular mail not reaching Bonne Bay. Why they did not forward the mail he was unable to say He showed the P. M. G. his reply the telegram before forwarding it and e agreed with him in what he said He then referred to a message pul ished in the Evening Telegram the 13th instant, showing "that th isgraceful disorganization of the nail service had virtually tied ousiness operations on the coast Mails dispatched hence for Bay slands are taken to St. John's vi Port aux Basques, and local men an only now receiving telegraphed ac knowledgments of the receipt of let ters at Bay of Islands, dated from Bonne Bay the first week of Feb ruary. The P. M. G. either does no know his business or is displaying total disregard for the interests of tha east. The receipt of weekly mai to Bonne Bay regularly since the en of February, the route via Millertow Junction being easily available an ransportation to be obtained by dos We wish to emphasize that on the im mediate re-establishment of a regula mail service, and especially upon the prompt institution of measures, tha will ensure the early re-opening o the railroad for through freight and ssenger traffic depend the livel north west coast. Delay will mean much loss to all concerned in our fisheries." This telegram is signed by the principal men of Bonne Bay, namely, J. P. Haliburton, Geo. W. Wilton, Stephen Taylor, Thomas W. Rose. Wm.
