Not Gone Back On Its Principles.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir:—There is a good deal of anxiety about here as to who are going to represent the Southern Shore in the ranks of the Bond Party after next election. Have no two pluck enough to contest the District against Cashin and Moore this time? What has put it into people's heads that this fine old Liberal District has gone back on its old time honored principles of Liberalism. I admit with some feeling of personal shame that we blundered four years ago, but our eyes have been opened and we admit we have in many ways been deceived by the Morris cry, and false promises, and that common silly craze all Newfoundlanders have for a change. It is good that men should blunder sometimes that they may learn their shortsightedness and avoid errors before it is too late. They are generally led in politics by the prospect of what they are going to get out of it, and often in their selfishness, due to the narrow and narrow environments, they lose sight of larger issues, and take little stock in men or things beyond their own narrow circle and their private interests and those of their friends.

Narrow-mindedness, ignorance, greed, and those qualities of degeneracy have blinded the finer feelings and blinded men to that sense of honesty, justice and patriotism that should itself be the conduct of men of better moulds. Self first, friends second and country last, is the order in which our concerns are directed; how is it that politicians, knowing our weakness, always, of late years especially, appeal to our lower instincts, carry us away by promises that excite our selfishness, and keep us blind to the evidence that in so doing they are only making tools of us for their own advancement, our own disappointment and our country's ruin. The last election was proof of what I say, and the last four years' work of the Morris Party a stern eye-opener to the fact that a majority of the people were badly duped and the country's finances rushed to the brink of ruin. I will go so far as to say that at last election many of us made fools of ourselves, and if asked then or since what we expected, except in a few cases where fellows were promised jobs, we could not point to one object for our own or our country's benefit we could hope to gain.

We seem to have been blinded not only to the fact that the game for us personally was not worth the candle, but that we were compromising ourselves in the eyes, not only of those whose esteem we should have valued, but that we by our conduct were sacrificing our reputation

as good members of a parish and showing to the outside world that for the sake of proving our independence and as we thought, our superior judgment in state matters, while we certainly know little about our own that we were in reality, at least for the time being, a lot of brainless fanatics. We have thought it all over since, and we have had abundant proof how little Cashin and Moore, or indeed Morris or his Government, thought of us when once they had a free hand to enter upon a career of reckless extravagance and boodle. What a bonanza Morris and his crowd had for the last four years and a half. Bond's Manifesto should get every intelligent honest man thinking.

What a revelation of Wholesale Corruption.

Is every sense of patriotism and civic justice so dead, that realizing the condition of this country at the present moment, and the absolute certainty of bankruptcy, should Morris again get the reins of Government, these men will not be aroused by the exigencies of the situation, unite shoulder to shoulder and vote for the man who alone can save us from imminent ruin and disgrace. Morris will borrow with an utter disregard for the consequences—wreck Bond who comes to the rescue at his country's call will reform and save us.

Don't Vote Like Hirelings, but as Free Men.

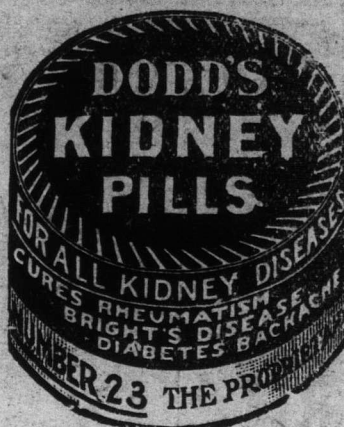
