### Models of Patience.

"As a study in hobbies the model engineering exhibition now opened in the Royal Horticultural Hall, Westminster, is of unusual interest and illustrates in striking fashion the way in which busy men spend their spare moments," says the Daily Mail.

### Cable News.

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.

As the result of the showing made in the elections on Tuesday, when the votes of the recently enfranchised women were said to have placed 18 out of 24 municipalities voting in the dry column, 300 cities and villages in Illinois will hold Local Option elections next spring. This was the statement of Scott McBride, State Superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League. Under normal conditions, McBride said, as the vote of Tuesday shows, the women will be 3 to 1 on the side of Dry. The organized property proportion should be 4 to 1.

MONTREAL, To-day.

Captain Makell, of the liner Serana, just arrived from the West Indies, reports having narrowly escaped running foul of Canada's new and island, thirty miles north of Sable Island. The Serana ran into heavy fog as she approached Sable Island, which has always been given wide berth by mariners, because of its notorious reputation. Soundings taken showing only twenty fathoms of water where charts called for sixty. Astounded at the discovery, Captain Makell steered further eastward, examined the compasses and worked back his charts, but was unable to figure out the phenomenon. Being sure he had followed prescribed course clear of Sable Island, the continued soundings taken showing only thirty fathoms where ocean should have been unfathomable, or nearly so. Considerable relief came to captain and crew when the coast of Cape Breton Island was sighted. However it was not until he reached Montreal and read of the discovery of the new island, the mystery of the discrepancies in soundings was cleared up.

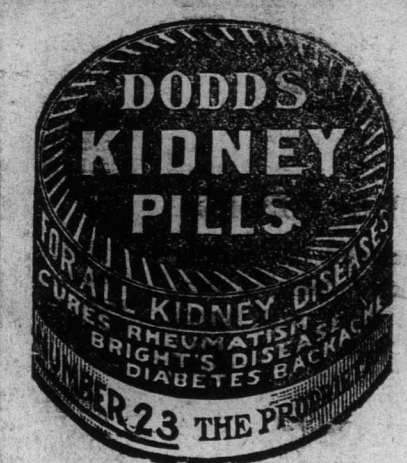
### Here and There.

HAVANA, To-day.

General Felix Diaz was stabbed by a Mexican last night and wounded twice, probably not fatally. The attack on Diaz occurred while walking at a fashionable promenade. He was wounded behind the ear and in the neck, besides receiving several blows in the head from a cane. Diaz was removed to the hospital and his assailant arrested.

### WASHINGTON, To-day.

There are no new developments. This is the word that comes from the White House that the President considers elections on October 26 not only invalid as to vote taken on Presidency and Vice-Presidency, but also as to the election of members of Congress, and dispatches yesterday indicated that Huerta would convene the newly elected Congress and abide by their decision as to the legality of the elections. This was looked upon generally here as an intention on the part of Huerta to have the election nullified, while he continued in power indefinitely, though the President made it plain to callers that he had no intention at present of laying the subject before Congress. He is keeping in close touch with the capital through Chairman Bacon of the Senate's Foreign Relations Committee. It is not regarded as likely that the President will make any move until he hears from Huerta through Charge O'Shaughnessy. Newspaper dispatches have indicated that Huerta would refuse to retire officially, it is said nothing along this line of a definite character has been received.
