Dr. Adams **Lectures** on Deformities.

At the lecture given last night in Grenfell Hall, a fair sized audience attended, although it was not so large as might have been expected. Bowring and G. Grimes, M. H. A. Sir Edward Morris in introducing Dr. Adams told of the work the latter had done since his arrival here last week. He had examined some 200 cases and performed a dozen or so of operatons, types of different classes of deformities, before a number of the medical practitioners of the

Dr. Adams was warmly welcomed on rising to speak on his subject "Deformities and Possible Prevention." He commenced by telling of the great social and economic work performed by the medical fraternity in the way of prevention. He instanced the great work in Panama Cuba, and Porto Rico of the medica fraternity in clearing these zones of Yellow Jack, etc., and he told of the cutting down of 200,000 deaths in the United States from Tuberculosis to 56 000 These were the great contrioutions the profession was making the whole world. For himself, al ist, he did not claim he knew more in the aggregate than the general practitioner, he was an Orthopedist, and he knew more in that special branch than the general practitioner because he had more experience in dealing with and studying more cases than came within the field of the general practitioner.
