NEW YORK ANARCHISTS GO BEFORE GRAND JURY.

New York, March 3.—In presenting to the grand jury the case of Frank Albarno and John Carbone, who are accused of placing bombs in St. Patrick's Cathedral yesterday, district attorney Perkins will ask for their indictment under a section of the penal code designating as a felony an act of persons who attempt to explode explosives in any building with intent to destroy, although no damage is done.

The penalty upon conviction may be 25 years in state prison. Policemen, not in uniform, who were detailed yesterday to maintain a watch over St. Patrick's Cathedral, continued on duty to-day, and it was said that a strong force of police have been tracing the men suspected of bomb making, that several would be assigned to guard other churches

against which attacks were expected to be made.

PUT INTO NORTH HARBOR.

The schooner Nellie Louise, Capt. Burke, now fifty-five days out to this port from Pernambuco in ballast, is at North Harbor, St. Mary's Bay, having put in there on Thursday last. This will be welcome news and also allay the anxiety that was beginning to be felt for the vessel and her crew. Mr. George Adams, of Bowring's office, who left here four months ago on the vessel on a health trip, came to town by train Saturday night from Whitbourne. Before he met the train he had to walk 20 miles. From North Harbor he covered 12 miles by foot to Colinet and then left for Whitbourne, a distance of 16 miles, part of which he also had to tramp. Mr. Adams looks well after his trip and put on a considerable amount of avoirdupois. He reports that the Nellie Louise has been on this coast the past three weeks, experienced many storms, having her mizzen carried away and sails badly torn. No further damage was done and the vessel not being able to contend with the heavy ice that was met put into North Harbor, as mentioned. The crew are all well and as soon as the ice blockade clears away the vessel will try to make this port.

A gloom was cast over Dunville on the 9th inst., when it was made known that Michael Tobin, eldest son of Patrick and Agnes Tobin, had been drowned at sea from the steam trawler Heroine, of Boston. The news of the sad occurrence was called Rt. Rev. Mons. Reardon, by his uncle, Peter Tobin, Captain of the vessel, and when it was conveyed to the parents they were inconsolable at the loss of their darling son, and the sympathy of the whole community goes out to them in their sad affliction. To make the news all the more pathetic, a few hours before the sad message came, his mother received a letter from him in which he stated that he was tired of fishing, and that he intended to remain on shore after that trip.

The deceased, who was only in his 19th year, was a promising young man, and had he lived would have made a name for himself. Whilst at school he was noted for his ability, and during his scholastic career passed several of the C. H. E. Examinations.
