

And now there are gratifying signs that the other source of help, a diversion from without, will not be allowed to fail. The arrival of General Roques at Athens and the capture of Monastir have combined, whether by mere coincidence or not cannot be said, to make the time ripe for a thorough understanding with Greece. The demonstration of the Allies' strength against the formidable German-Bulgarian defences is bound to make a deep impression upon doubting Greece and win many more volunteers to their flag. In any case, the Entente Powers seem to have decided that the role of Greece must be defined once and for all. Something in the nature of an ultimatum has been handed to her Government and the enemy plenipotentiaries have been given notice to quit. The nature of the measures to be taken hereafter will depend upon the nature of her reply. It looks like the last chance for Greece to declare herself a united country and throw in her lot whole-heartedly with the Allies if she does not, she may look for drastic treatment from them, and they will welcome such of her subjects as pay flock to their standard, render the Royalist party entirely incapable of harm, prevent civil strife and get on with the fighting. The time has now come when Greece must cease to be a stumbling-block; if she is blind to her manifest destiny, she must be compelled towards it, suffering, it may be, in the process the just punishment of her blindness.

Yet they are supposed to pay their bills, feed, clothe and educate their families as other people do at the same old rate. They must give their time and perform their duties satisfactorily or otherwise upon the same salary as heretofore.
