The Coronation of Napoleon I.

December 2, 1804, in the history of France, marks the coronation of Napoleon Bonaparte as its Emperor. The idea had been broached early in the year, but Napoleon seemed to have had an unusual fit of hesitation, and when the Senate offered him the crown, he begged time for reflection. Whether he had really any doubts as to what he would ultimately do, no one knows, but his first course was to send to Austria, Prussia, and other minor powers of Europe, to ascertain what they thought of the project. Recognizing that the restoration of Bourbon was most improbable, all the Courts expressed their satisfaction at the termination of the French Republic; while, urged by the hope of promotion, the officials of the State, and the officers of the Army, petitioned Napoleon to accept the throne. This enthusiasm, kindled by self-interest on the part of the Senate spread all over France, and addresses poured in from every side, begging Napoleon to consent to the project. After a becoming show of reluctance, the First Consul intimated to the people that he would deign to become their ruler, and extensive preparations were at once set on foot to celebrate the Coronation. December 2 fell on a Sunday, and for weeks beforehand people poured into Paris, in order to be in the city on the eventful day. Notre Dame was decorated magnificently, an immense throne being erected at the west end for the Emperor and Empress. Napoleon, arrayed in robes especially designed by a famous painter, and wearing a golden crown to laurels drove from the Tuilleries to the Cathedral in a carriage nearly all windows. When the Pope—who at Napoleon's request had journeyed from Rome in order to be present on this occasion—had blessed the sword and sceptre, and anointed the Emperor-elect, he turned to take the crown and place it upon Napoleon's brow. But, without a moment's hesitation, that imperious little man waved him aside, and crowned himself first, and Josephine afterwards. For a moment the vast crowd was speechless at this audacity, then a cry of "Vive l'Empereur!"

The Great Adventure OF THE PRINCE OF WALES.

TORONTO, November 26.—Under the caption "The great Adventure of the Prince," the Toronto World commenting editorially this morning on the political significance of the visit of the Prince of Wales to Canada and his speeches, says, in part: "Now that the Prince of Wales has left for home, there is likely to be more discussion as to the political significance and consequence of his visit to Canada. For instance, in his farewell message he claims Canada as his home, that he is a Canadian, and that he intends to return here again."

"So far there has been no clear-cut discussion either in the public press of Britain, or by the public men of the various parts of the Empire, as to what the tendency of the new movement, more or less centered in the Prince's visit is. And the world will be surprised if there is not considerable reference here and elsewhere to the visit and of its significance and as to its future bearings. "The World simply takes the opportunity of this most successful visit of the Prince of Wales to Canada to say that before any more missions are sent across or visits of the heir apparent are made, that there must be a full discussion, and with this end in view, the Government at Ottawa ought to disclose the exact conditions under which the Prince came to Canada; make a full report of the political addresses, if any, that he gave, and whether or not the Government at Ottawa and the Government of Great Britain accept responsibility for the visit, for speeches made, and the special object, if any, of the visit in question. There are even people who are ready to propose that the next occupant of the throne of Great Britain be given a parliamentary title to a throne to be created in Canada, with two objects in view; that the British throne should be established on a new and firmer basis in Canada and that in case of any revolution in the Old Country, that the base of the throne be transferred to America."

"What The World is doing by calling attention to this visit is to prepare our people and our public men for a very important discussion in connection with our future relations to the empire, and to the throne, a discussion as to what has already developed or which may develop, in a more surprising way hereafter. 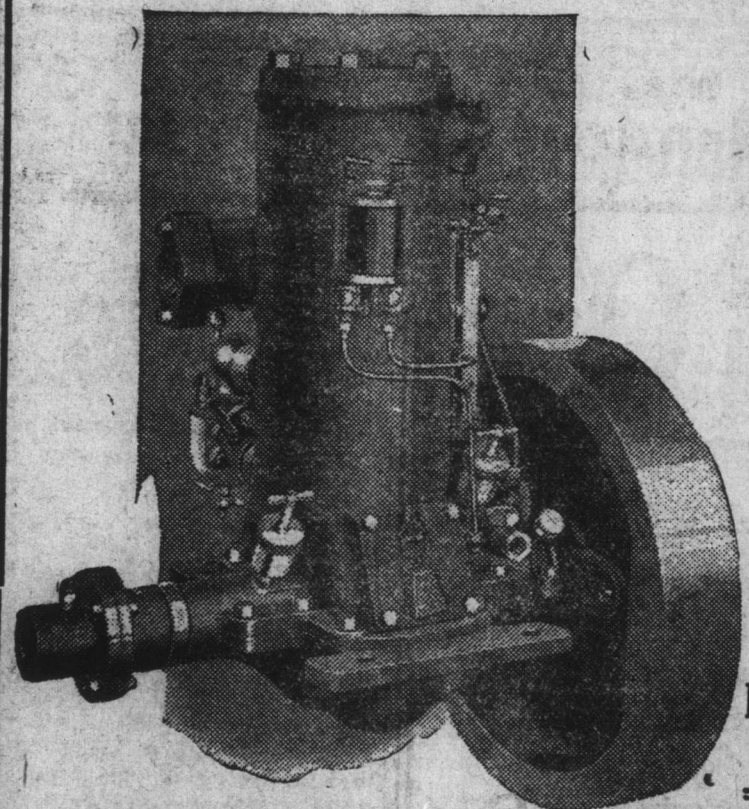
