TO TAKE EXERCISE FREELY.

During the spring season fowls hav ng free range get abundant exercis Close confinement without exercise not conductive to the best results, although the feed provided may be the best, for idle hens spon grow too fat to lay. It is almost impossible to give aying hens which are confined too exercise. The fowls may be enred to exercise in various ways, ich as feeding corn on the cob, sus-anding cabbage heads, beets, etc., so that the birds have to jump for them, and scattering grain in the litter. The litter should be from 4 to 8 inches deep, and may consist of straw (either out or whole), hay, leaves, buck-wheat hulls, shredded corn fodder, or any convenient material of this naure. The hens should be kept hun colds from evening or morning ex-cosures in homes equipped with the gently all day for the grain scattered imphry Radiant Fire. 
