The Income Tax.

"A strong movement is now on foot in the United States, aiming at the reduction of the income tax. Sir Augustus Nanton, who has just returned from Great Britain, reports that there is a similar feeling there. He says:—

"From what one sees in the press and hears on the street it seems as if it is generally agreed that too heavy taxation retards trade and in the end is harder on the working people than on the well-to-do; and it appears for that reason the British income tax is likely to be largely reduced in the near future. When this is done it is claimed Britain will soon regain her old position of being able to compete with the world for trade and that unemployment will be a thing of the past. I have always been a believer that those that were well off should pay full taxes, but if government go too far they simply take for government use the money that would otherwise go into trade and help the working people."

Though opposition to any tax which bears lightly on those of small income was difficult in war time, there have been many voices of protest against the income tax in Canada during the past year or so. Only last Monday J. F. M. Steward, a prominent Canadian manufacturer, criticized it strongly in a speech in Toronto.

But the need of revenue in Canada is too great, and the ground upon which the income tax rests is too solid, to justify it being tampered with. It is now a progressive tax, levied in proportion not to income but to ability to pay. Along with the customs and excise duties, which fall most heavily upon those of small means, it rounds out our national taxation very nicely. It has yielded substantial and growing returns, so that it may well be referred to, as it was termed in Great Britain many years ago, a great engine of the national revenue.—Monetary Times.

Price Reduced in Sheffield.

There have been further reductions in Sheffield in the price of files, edge tools, plates and cutlery, says the Maritime Merchant, Halifax N.S. The drop is largest in stainless cutlery, but advices from the Old Country state that it is advisable to be cautious in buying cheap knives of this variety because a great quantity of "wasters" and inferior goods is being distributed: good quality of stainless knife can not be made to sell at some of the prices being quoted to-day.

The following Rules and Regulations were Adopted by the Association at their Annual Meeting held April 18th, 1922:

- 1st—Closing Hours: Stores to close at 6 p.m. until Friday, December 8th. Saturdays at 9.30 p.m. To close 10 p.m. from Monday, December 11th, until December 30th.
- To close at 6 p.m. from January 2nd, 1923 until the day of the Annual Meeting. Saturdays at 9.30 p.m.
- Any week in which a holiday occurs on Saturday, stores will remain open until 9.30 p.m. on Friday.
- 2nd—Holidays—April 24th, May 24th, June 2nd, July 1st, August 2nd, 23rd, September 6th, December 25th, 1922. January 1st, 24th, February 14th, March 17th, 30th, 23rd, 1923. Thanksgiving Day as proclaimed by the government.
- 3rd—Half Holidays: June 7th, 14th, July 5, 12, 19, 26; August 9, 16, 30; Sept. 13th, 1922. January 31st, February 7, 28th. March 7, 21st; April 4th, 11th, 1923; Stores to close at 12.30 p.m.
- 4th—Any week during the season in which there may be a general Holiday other than as herein arranged for, a regular half holiday will not be observed.
- 5th—Closing hours apply to the closing of the stores to the General Public, and it must be distinctly understood that assistants shall work after these hours whenever so required.

N.B.—The attention of the public is called to the above regulations, and purchasers are asked to co-operate by making purchases before the hour named for closing the Stores.
