A Good Word for Tea.

There are a certain number of our little weaknesses which from time to time receive castigation from scientists, who would have us living according to invariable rule; among these small indiscretions is tea. A recent book, widely commented on by the Press, has, among other attacks on woman's method of living, laid it down that have is being worked among our feminine kind by excessive tea drinking. But it is doubtful if there are sufficient scientific data to maintain this attack.

The two substances in tea which are feared by the scaremonger-hygienist are caffeine (sometimes called theine) and tannin. The first is a nervous and cardiac stimulant, and the second has an astringent action capable of causing digestive disturbance in certain circumstances.

Now much as one may decry the use of stimulants, there is this good to be said about caffeine: there is no subsequent depression, and its action may tide over a period of nervous depression. The public are well aware of the possible deleterious effects of tannin, and stewed tea is rarely encountered nowadays. That caffeine is not so vicious as is usually stated is shown by the robust Indian peasant, who has his coffee forever on the stove; and that the dangers of over-brewed tea have been exaggerated is evidenced by the manner in which the private soldier thrives during the late war on that beverage which violates every canon of tea-making—Army tea.

Biggest Pulpwood
Load Over 12 Cords.MAINE TEAM WALKS OFF WITH
23 TONS OF IT ON SLED.

LUBEC, Me., March 10.—The largest load of pulp wood ever hauled in Maine, so lumbermen believe, was that taken from the woods at Ventrabrook, near Denysville, last week by the Higgins crew. This load was piled on a sled 32 feet or four cords long, inside 12-foot stakes. The scaler of the Warren Paper Company, Cumberland Mills, measured the load and found that, owing to a spreading of the stakes, there were 13 cords and three feet, estimated to weigh 23 tons. This was hauled by a pair of horses from the woods to the railroad over a specially prepared road.

Coastal Boats Report.

ICE MOVING OFF LAND.

S.S. Sagona, Capt. Tavernor, arrived at St. John's 6.30 o'clock this morning, and she was expected to leave there at noon to proceed to Placentia Bay to relieve the S. S. Watchdog, which ship has been jammed in the ice for some weeks past. The Sagona will take the Watchdog's cargo and will deliver the much needed supplies in the settlements at Placentia Bay. S.S. Senat reports as being still jammed one mile west by south of Sagona Island. The ice is reported very heavy between Cousseigne Head, Sagona and Brunette Islands, but is moving rapidly out of the bay. The wind is blowing from the Eastward and it is quite possible that the Senat will get clear to-day.

The largest load of pulp wood previously reported measured about 11 cords, and was hauled by a team belonging to the Orono Pulp and Paper Company.

Special gold medals will be awarded the winners of the various classes. A feature of the meet will be the boxing bouts in the 98 lb. class between J. Burgess and E. Whittle for a special medal donated by Sergt. Arthur Johnson. Boxing enthusiasts will also be delighted to hear that Mr. R. Burt, who caused quite an impression last year, will be seen in action in the featherweight finals against C. Stone, one of our local boys. Stone has the goods and is well backed by his supporters. Eleven championship bouts are carded and a real evening's sport is in store for all who attend. The programme of events is as follows:

Giant Electric Lamps.

A 30,000-Watt incandescent lamp, having a capacity of about 60,000 candlepower, the largest lamp of its kind ever manufactured, was shown publicly for the first time at a recent

convention of the Illuminating Engineering Society at Swampscott, Mass.

This monster lamp was developed and constructed at the National Lamp Works of the General Electric Company at Cleveland, Ohio, primarily for motion picture studio use. Its wattage is 1200 times larger than the average household lamp, and the electric power required to operate three such lamps would be sufficient to operate the average trolley car.

This lamp has a bulb 12 inches in diameter and 18½ inches high. The light which it produces is equal to the combined light from 2400 electric lamps of the size commonly used in the home. The filament is made of tungsten wire, one-tenth inch in diameter and 93 inches long, constructed in four coils.

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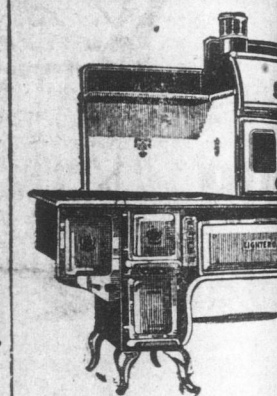

Cleaning Cut Glass

Articles of finely cut glass are often successfully cleaned with water. This is because a film of soap clings to the glass after drying and gives a cloudy effect.

The best way of cleaning glass is to make a paste of whiting and water and then rub this all over the article so that it collects all the dirt. Leave until quite dry, then remove with a soft cloth. Polish the glass with a muslin cloth.

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
