Paris.-The renewed interest of Western Europe in the Russian problem is evidenced by an article contributed to the magazine Revue des Deux Mondes by Count W. Kokovtzoff, who was Russian minister of finance in 1894 in succession to Count Witte, and who filled the post of premier under the Czar from 1911 to 1914.

Kokovtzoff takes up the present Russian economic situation from every standpoint and endeavors to prove that Bolshevism has, by steady the economic ruin of Russia. For the reconstruction of Russia the writer believes that the right of private property must be re-established and that the Bolsheviks must renounce the system of monopolies and capitalism conducted by the Soviet state which, he insists, strangles the economic development of the country. External and internal commerce must become the exclusive prerogative of private initiative; nationalized industry and transportation must be denationalized and, above all, elementary justice must reign in Russia and every Russian must be alowed to

breathe freely on his native soil. To win these and other reforms Kokovtzoff is convinced that the total liquidation of the Soviet regime is essential. He therefore is less conciliatory toward Bolshevism than Basil Maklakoff, Russian ambassador to France, who, in a recent interview with The Associated Press, foresaw the possibility of a unified Russian effort to reconstruct Russia be fore the total annihilation of the Soviet regime. Further developing his ideas in this respect Ambassado Maklakoff told the correspondent that when essential reforms, like recognition of private property, have been effected and a general rallying to Russia is possible by all Russians of whatever class, he thought the Soviet system would be likely to continue for some time. Even after a radical change in the 'Russian administration, Russian life and activities would naturally concentrate in the provinces and be more or less outside the control of the central government.

To my mind, the ambassador said, he central government will necessarily be poor and feeble, with a small budget and a limited authority. Russia/will organize from the bottom up ward, the development of local life and authority will precede that of the entral government. #### Canadian Trade With U.S. Decreased in 1922.

OTTAWA, Ont.-Canada's foreign ade for 1922 amounted to \$1.-647,701,892, or an increase of more nore than \$45,000,000 over 1921, acording to the report of the federal department of trade and commerce.

Total imports for the year amounted to \$762,339,309, the report shows. Total exports reached \$884.362.583. The year closed with a favorable trade balance of \$3,221,337

Great Britain was Canada's best cus mer during 1922 and the United States was second, according to the report. England purchased Canadian roducts to the extent of \$374,751,894, in increase of more than \$65,000,000 ver 1921, while the United States purhased \$340,156,247 worth of goods, an crease of about \$14,000,000 over 1921. A surprising feature of the report is he fact that Canada's purchases from the United States during 1922 showed a decline as compared with 1921. amounting to \$506.823.760, as against \$555,091,000, a falling off of \$45,267,240. Canada's purchases from Great Brit ain showed an increase in value of more than \$13,000,000, jumping from \$123,149,776 in 1921, to \$136,866,288,

### "Columbia" Ready for the Water.

Gloucester's latest addition to the fishing fleet, the Columbia, will be the ice is out of the Essex River, and will engage in the salt fishery out

The new schooner, hailed as a conender for honors in the annual international fishermen's race, has been built for fishing rather than for racing, and no fishing trip will be abandoned in order that she may take part in the elimination races to choose the representative of the American fishing fleet, her owners, the Columbia Associates announced re-

Whether the Columbia will ever gain racing honors or not, however, she will have a racing captain. The owners of the schooner have signed as skipper Captain Alden Geele of Yarmouth, N.S., part owner of the schooner Elsie when she lost to the Canadian Bluenose two years ago. Capt. Geele arrived in Gloucester recently to take charge of the Columbia as soon as conditions permit. He states that a great many Nova Scotian fishermen are looking for sites to go in American vessels, and that he expects to have the best crew of salt fishermen for the Columbia that ever sailed on a trip. As soon as the vessel is ready, Capt. Geele will go to Shelburne, N.S., and the Columbia will sail from there to the
