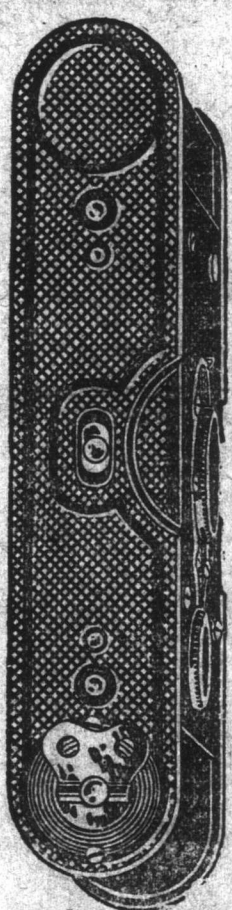

## Two Reported Attempts

AT MONTREAL TO RESCUE BANK  
ROBBERS.

MONTREAL, May 15.—Le Canada, French language newspaper of this city, asks under a two-column head this morning whether an attempt to rescue eight suspects, at present held charged of murder in connection with the hold-up of the Hochelaga Bank collection car on April 1, was not made last Friday night. The paper says that it hears that an automobile carrying several men pulled up that night, before the principal entrance of Bordeaux Jail and its occupants enquired of a prison guard the whereabouts of the exact spot where the suspects' cells are located. The guard at once fired in the air it is said, and about fifty guards rushed up while the automobile made off at speed.

Le Canada says that if the above attempt is as reported, it would constitute the second effort to rescue the suspects. It states that when Serafini and Nigri were taken in the police wagon to Bordeaux a few days ago, the police were warned of an attempt to rescue them. Careful precautions were taken and nothing happened at that time.

## Our Wild Beasts

Several captures of wild cats have been reported recently from Scotland. They serve to remind us that Britain was once overrun with wild beasts such as now are to be found only in such remote corners of Europe as the mountains of Northern Scandinavia and Albania and the deep forests of Poland and Russia.

The wild cat is not to be confused, of course, with the domestic pussies who have taken to the woods. He is a much more powerful and formidable fellow. He is generally a grey tabby, and his black "splashes" are very vivid, as is the black stripe down the middle of his back. A good clue to his identity is provided by his tail being bushy near the tip, instead of tapering to a point.

The wild cat is one of the fiercest beasts in the world. The naturalist Pennant named him the British tiger. The menacing way in which he crouches with lowered ears and snarls, without the slightest provocation, is a significant danger signal that will deter even the most tender-hearted wanderer in the forest from putting his knee and calling "Puss, puss, puss!"

The last English survivor, it is believed to have been the specimen killed in Bullington Forest, Lincolnshire, just forty years ago. It is probable that there are still a few in the dense forests of North Wales. Its last British stronghold, however, is the northwest of Scotland, in the Gesolade deer forest wilderness of rocks and pines and heather, more particularly the Balmacran Forest, where the Earls of Seafield used to keep a number of them in cages for breeding purposes.

Wild cats sleep in the trees, but hunt rabbits, grouse, pheasants, hares and other prey by night. They have been mated with Persian and other domestic cats, but the spitefulness of the progeny has not tempted breeders to repeat the experiment, notwithstanding the handsome coats of the kittens.

## Murderer Pardoned

FOR UNRAVELLING PUZZLE.

There is a story in the stories of the old State House at Albany, N.Y. The marble for the building was cut from the Mt. Pleasant prison quarries, now Sing Sing, under the supervision of Andrea Dubre, who was serving a life sentence for murder. When the marble blocks were being cut to size Dubre changed the markings to a system distinctly individual and which he alone understood. The architect and the master mason soon found that the prisoner had blocked the construction. Gov. Maey decided that the only feasible thing to do was to bring Dubre to Albany to assemble the puzzle. He was offered a pardon if he could undo what he had done. Working under guard he straightened out the tangle and left the completed building a free man.

## Bob-Haired Bandit

AND HUSBAND SENT TO PRISON  
FOR FROM 10 TO 20 YEARS.

NEW YORK, May 8.—Mrs. Celia Cooney, the famous bob-haired bandit, and her husband and partner in crime, Edward Cooney, were sentenced to serve from 10 to 20 years each in prison by County Judge Martin, of Brooklyn, to-day.

Half an hour before she had told the jail warden she hoped Judge Martin would be lenient and that she and her husband could be sent to the same prison.

He sent the woman to Auburn and the man to Sing Sing.

## INCREASE IN MINTYRE DIVIDEND IS EXPECTED.

(Montreal Daily Star May 8.)

TORONTO.—When the McIntyre option on treasury stock, now standing in the name of Miller & Co., is exercised at the end of the present month, some announcement is anticipated in regard to dividend. McIntyre is now paying five per cent three yearly or 75 cents per share per annum, and it is understood that this is to be raised for the time being to a quarterly dividend of five per cent which would give an annual yield of a dollar a share or a return of slightly over six per cent on its present market price.

It is understood that it was decided to put the stock on a quarterly dividend basis at the last directors' meeting held some days ago. Official confirmation, however, cannot be obtained as President J. P. Bickel is now west in connection with the Blue Diamond Coal subsidiary and is likely to be away for a fortnight yet.

McIntyre's fiscal year ends with June, and it is probable that the increased dividend will be effective from the beginning of the New Year. As McIntyre paid its last dividend May 1st, it is therefore probable that the customary four months will elapse before the next dividend on August 1, which would be the end of the first quarter of the company's new year. Thenceforth, however, it is understood that dividends will be paid every three months. Even at the increased rate, McIntyre will show earnings in excess of twice its dividend requirements.
