FRENCH LOSSES.
 GREAT FRENCH MOROCCO, May 26. Fifty French soldiers, including officers, were killed, and one hundred native troops wounded during the French retirement which is continuing. No estimate of Riff losses was available.

EIGHT KILLED IN ELECTION FIGHTS.
 DE FRANCE, Martinique, May 26. Sixty persons were killed and thirty wounded in disorders in several towns during yesterday's Municipal elections.

QUEEN MARY CELEBRATES BIRTHDAY.
 LONDON, May 26. Queen Mary to-day quietly celebrated her fifty-eighth birthday. She received a great flood of congratulations from all parts of the Empire.

REPINGTON DIES SUDDENLY.
 LONDON, May 26. Lt. Colonel C. A. Repington, noted correspondent and writer on military subjects, died last night of apoplexy, at Hove. It was announced here today.

U.S. DISCUSSING RELIEF FOR AMUNDSEN.
 WASHINGTON, May 26. Government relief for the Amundsen expedition to the North Pole is being discussed by President Coolidge, but he is not certain that the situation had reached a point where such aid would be justified, it was disclosed today.

MAE GETS DIVORCE.
 PARIS, May 26. Mae Murray, moving picture actress, has granted a divorce to-day from her husband, Robert E. Leonard, on the grounds of cruelty, disdain, contempt and failure to provide.

A HARDY ADVENTURE.
 ROME, May 26. Giuseppe Rossarolo, Italian sportsman, will steer his tiny one-man sloop to sail and row round the world. He will cross France by river and canal and make for Liverpool when strikes out across the Atlantic.

BARE RUTH BETTER.
 NEW YORK, May 26. Babe Ruth appeared in uniform at the Yankee Stadium to-day and batted in the first practice ball, but remained on the bench, and it was not known when he would be able to play, according to Miller Huggins, manager of the Yankees.

FIRST STEAMER THROUGH STRAITS.
 QUEBEC, May 26. The Latvian freight steamer, Skants, captured the honor of being the first steamer to pass through the Strait of Belle Isle this season of navigation. So judge from the report of the Quebec service office, which credits the vessel with having passed the en-

trance to the Straits at eight o'clock Sunday night on the way to the Atlantic Ocean and Mediterranean ports. The fact that one freighter has negotiated the Strait service successfully may cause other similar vessels to try the route, but it is not expected passenger liners will do so for the next three or four days at least.

SPEED BOAT BEATS TRAIN.
 NEW YORK, May 26. Gar Wood, driving his motor speed boat, Baby Gar IV, to-day, beat the time of the Crack Twentieth Century, Limited, between Albany and New York City. Wood's time was given by an official observer as two hours and 58 minutes. The Twentieth Century's time is three hours and ten minutes.

NOTHING YET FROM AMUNDSEN.
 OSLO, May 26. A telegram received to-day by the Shipping Gazette from Spitzbergen, said explorer Amundsen had not returned from the North Pole flight this morning. The weather continues less favorable, it was reported.

JAP VOLCANO ACTIVE.
 TOKIO, May 26. Despatches from the Nichi Nichi correspondent at Kasogami report an explosion of Mount Sawayashima, the active volcano on Oshima Island. The eruption sent huge rocks tumbling down the mountain crushing a number of dwellings at the base. The inhabitants fled to Nakhima Island.

CHARGED WITH MURDER.
 TORONTO, May 26. Isabel Poruze and Bessie Carrilly, sought by the police on a charge of murder arising out of the death of Mrs. Margaret A. Mick, matron of the Municipal Jail farm for women as a result of injuries she received

when assaulted by the girls and a companion, Jeanette McMin, after which they escaped from the institution, were arrested by the Ottawa authorities to-day. They were taken to the police station where they were handed over to Major W. Morrison, Superintendent of the jail farm, who brought them back to Toronto. Jeanette McMin was arrested yesterday and together with three young men appeared in court this morning and were remanded for a week.

FRENCH EMBASSY MAINTAINED.
 PARIS, May 26. An agreement was reached to-day by the Government and Opposition in the senate whereby the French Embassy at the Vatican will be maintained.

MRS. ELIZABETH DUNN.
 After an illness of only a few days, Mrs. Elizabeth Dunn passed away at Hopewell, Trinity Bay, on Thursday, the 14th inst. The deceased was 75 years of age. Her husband, the late James Dunn, predeceased her over 21 years ago, and from that time until her death, she carried on a very successful business, supplied for the local fisheries, and took a very active interest in milling and logging and in all the various kinds of work in which the people of her native place were engaged. On the north side of Trinity Bay as well as on the south, she was well and favorably known. At her home the stranger was sure of a kindly welcome. The one who came to ask for help was hardly ever sent away disappointed, and her charity and kindness and many other fine traits of character gained the goodwill and respect of all classes of the people with whom she lived.

The funeral on Sunday, the 17th, was the largest ever seen in the settlement. From far and near people came to pay their last tribute of respect to one they had known as a friend for years. Interment was at the R.C. Cemetery. She leaves three sons, Andrew and James, at home, and John, Bay St. George; and six daughters: Mrs. Thomas Cain, of Spaniard's Bay; Mrs. M. Murphy, Brigus; Mrs. J. Delaney, North Sydney; Mrs. H. George, Corner Brook; Mrs. Thos. Pilsent, Belle Vue, and Mrs. E. Collins Boston; one sister, Mrs. Thomas Lahay, St. John's, to all of whom the Telegram extends its sincere sympathy.

New Steamship Line

The Munson Steamship Line announces the inauguration of a new passenger and freight service between Boston and St. John's, Nfld., calling at Halifax, Nova Scotia. The first two sailings will be of freight steamers only, and the K.S. Tocco sailed from Boston on her first voyage on May 23rd, and is due in St. John's on May 25th. The Tocco will be followed by the departure of another freight steamer on June 12th from Boston, and on June 23rd the S.S. Munster, the first finally appointed passenger and freight steamer will sail on her first trip to St. John's via Halifax, arriving at St. John's, June 27th, and sailing on her return trip from St. John's on June 28th. The weather the Munster will maintain sailings every ten days, between St. John's, Halifax and Boston. The new services will be represented in St. John's by Messrs. A. E. Hickman Co., Ltd.

The addition of this service to the services operated by the Munson Steamship Lines, represents a new departure by reason of the entrance of the Munson Steamship Lines into this territory. While the Munson Lines are important factors in the freight world, maintaining services to the principal ports in Cuba, South America, West Indies and inter-coastal services between Boston, New York and Baltimore, to west coast ports in the United States, their important passenger services have been largely to the South, operating as they do regular passenger lines to Nassau (Bahamas), Antilla (Cuba), and between New Orleans and Havana. In addition to these services the Munson Lines also maintain fast passenger and freight services to the ports of Rio de Janeiro, Montevideo and Buenos Aires, and their full cargo operations cover all fields.
