Canadian Domestic War Loan

CANADIAN FORD COMPANY WILLING TO SUBSCRIBE A MILLION DOLLARS WHEN THE ISSUE IS MADE-MR. FORD IS PRO-BRITISH

He Blames Prussian Militarism for the War, and Believes That Germany Must be Beaten

From the Toronto Daily News.

Detroit, October 20-Mr Henry ord is pro-British.

"Tell the people of Canada for me that I am with them heart and soul," he said to Mr. Gor-don M. MacGregor, head of the Canadian Ford Motor Company.

Then he added, for his mind is full the latest child of his genius— tht, cheap tractors. "Tell them of the latest child of his genius— light, cheap tractors. "Tell them that on my return from California F will devote my attention to the tractor business to give them some-thing that will do more for Canada thing that will do more for Canada than any machine that has ever been introduced into the country."

Mr. MacGregor did not tell the people of Canada that Mr. Ford was with them heart and soul because he feared that it might affect detrimentally the business of the Ford Company with the German-Americans in the United States. Mr. Ford's statement is now published for the first time.

Pro-Ally Sentiments

"You may say that Mr. Ford has appressed the strongest pro-Ally seniments to officials of the firm, and o hundreds of his friends. There is

to hundreds of his friends. There is absolutely no doubt as to the sentinents of his heart. His father was born in Ireland and all his ancestors ame from the British Isles. It is ored in the bone of the man."

Mr. MacGregor was unwilling to some out with the statement lest it hould embarrass the company on he other side. His interviewer urgd that he should do so as a mater of simple justice to Mr. Ford, ie consented.

"He frankly admitted to me that Prussian militarism, was the worst form of militarism, that Prussian Militarism was chiefly to blame for this war, and that Germany had to be licked," said one of these men who had taken Mr. Ford to task when he returned on his eastern trip. turned from his eastern trip.

"Why I am as much pro-Ally as u are," Mr. Ford protested to a ou are," Mr. F anadian friend.

The Famous Remark

Mr. Ford has expressed indigna-ion that his now famous remark about the treatment he would advise for the loan commissioners had vise for the toan commissioners had ever got into the newspapers. It had never been intended as a public ut-

terance.

During his return journey from the east, Mr. Ford was chatting confidentially with half a dozen friends on the station at Albany, N. Y. Never thinking but that he was entirely among frends. Mr. Ford made the statement without much thought in the course of conversation. Somethe course of conversation. Some-one saw fit, without Mr. Ford's per-mission, to give it to the newspapers.

Opposed to War Loans

However much Canadians may disagree with Mr. Ford's views, in common justice it should be made plain that Mr. Ford publicly expressed his opposition to war loans at least as early as last April, before there was any suggestion that the Allies would seek to float such a loan in the seek to float such a loan in the United States. His remark, privately made with regard to this loan in particular was in accord with his previously expressed views on war in general. In fact Mr. Ford said to his friends: "If the loan were for Command Lebell decrease it test in the contract of the cont formany I should oppose it ten times more strongly."

The chief connection between the

United States and the Canadian com-panies is that the cars bear Mr. Ford's name. He himself owns only 25 per cent. of the stock of the Can-adian concern. The majority of it is held by Mr. MacGregor and his re-

Take Canada's Bonds.

So little weight do Mr. Ford's views with regard to the war loan carry in with regard to the war loan carry in the Canadian Company that one of the largest stockholders has taken \$50,000 of the loan stock, through the one bank in Detroit which is taking subscriptions. The Dodge Brothers recently disposed of their Canadian stock in New York. By the way, the transfer was made at \$1,500, which shows that Mr. Ford's utterances have not affected the price. It was transferred to a Mr. Fuller, who has been largely instrumental in arranging subscriptions to the allied loan.

Further, "If the Canaidan Government makes a flotation, the Canadian Ford Company, will take a million dallars worth of the bonds," said Mr. MacGregor to the Daily News.
