TORONTO, Feb. 6-11 p.m.—A slight in-
crease of pressure is taking place over Ontario
and the extreme Northwest; elsewhere there is

mild in Western Quebec, Ontario and
the greater portion of the Northwest.

LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—"Zozo" was not patronized by a very
large house last night.

—Miss E. O'Day, of this city, is visiting
relations at Claudioboy, Ont.

—Mr. Matthew Gran, of "The Condo-
liers," was in the city yesterday.

—A mile of smooth ice above the Spring-
bank dam affords excellent skating now.

—The Seventh non-coms have decided
that no liquor shall be allowed in their new
mess-rooms.

—There are exactly 681 supporters of
separate schools registered on the roll in
the city clerk's office.

—The ice crop this year has been
plentiful, and dealers promise that prices
will be within the range of vision.

—Inspector Bell is preparing another list
of delinquent statute labor debtors. They
will figure in the police court shortly.

—The rooms of the Young Liberal Club
are now open day and evening. Call and

—The students of the Western Medical
College have been invited to attend the
Y. M. C. A. reception on Tuesday evening.

—Another week's adjournment was given
by the police magistrate yesterday to
the case against John Lewis, charged with

violating the Liquor License Act on Satur-
day, Jan. 24.

—Prof. W. C. Barron, of this city, will

Ingersoll Baptist Church on Tuesday,
Feb. 11.

—Mr. James Knight, formerly with
Messrs. J. H. Chapman & Co. of this city,
has left for Chicago, where he intends mak-
ing his home.

—The special revival services which
have been held in the Wellington Street
Church for the past two weeks were discon-
tinued Thursday evening.

—Charles Lucas, who has been in jail for
several days for being mixed up in a queer
horse deal, was ticketed to Petrolia by the
authorities yesterday.

—The Dominion Illustrated Monthly of
Montreal publishes a fine cut of "New
Orchard Beach," Port Stanley, in a recent
issue. It makes a pretty picture.

—A juvenile lodge of the Sons of England
has been formed in East London with a
charter list of seventeen. The lodge will
be known as British Lion Lodge.

—Rev. Geo. Boyd, of this city, will
preach in the Methodist Church, Watford,
on Monday night in connection with the
special religious services now in progress.

—Messrs. R. Greene & Co., who pur-
chased the Palmer stock of clothing and
general furnishings, will remove the stock to
the Star Hall. As soon as the stock has
been checked they will announce the great
sale.

—The Grand Lodge of the Sons of Eng-
land will be convened at Hamilton on Tues-
day next. Messrs. Joseph Simmons and
John Nutkins, of East London, will be
among the delegates attending from the
several city lodges.

—Mr. James, of Colborne street north,
received the other day from a friend a copy
of the New York Herald of April 15, 1866,
containing an account of the assassination
of President Lincoln and the surrender of
Gen. Lee. The paper looks musty, but is
prized as quite a relic.

—Miss Lizzie Tuffs, of Boston, and
Miss Lizzie and Josie Chambers, of
Trenton, N. J., are the guests of Mr. D.
McKenzie, of South London. The visitors
were present at the Oldfellows' assembly
last evening and were favorably impressed
with London hospitality.

—Electrician Crawford received official
notice of his dismissal yesterday. He will
continue to officiate until a new man is ap-
pointed. Mr. Crawford has expressed his
intention of remaining in the city until he
has lived down the odium cast upon him.
He will commence business for himself.

—Patrick Quinn appeared before the
police magistrate yesterday charged with
breaking into the house of Henry Cameron
and also with being drunk and disorderly.
Quinn was fined \$10 or twenty days for
drunkenness, but was acquitted of the more
serious charge.

—At a special revival meeting held in
connection with the Colborne Street
Methodist Church last evening a number of
persons professed a desire to lead a new
life. Rev. E. E. Leachley and Rev. T. E.
Harrison were the speakers. They spoke
chiefly on the dangers of drifting away
from Christian influences.

—A party of Londoners on pleasure
boat drove out to Mr. and Mrs. O'Brien's
on con. 2, London township, Tuesday
evening, and, after spending a pleasant
time, presented their hostess with a hand-
some silver cake basket. The party re-
turned to the city in high spirits, which
even an upset into the snow did not dispel.

schools have formed a mutual benefit so-
ciety for the interchange of ideas and
mutual assistance in regard to their work.
Mrs. Olliphant, of East London, has been
elected president; Miss Coyne, of Colborne
street, vice-president; and Miss Mackin-
ton, of Talbot street, secretary-treasurer.

has been opened in the "Y" rooms for training
children in the principles of domestic work
on the kindergarten system. The class-
theses connected with the exercises add to
the fascination and undoubted benefit of
the course, and as the hour is arranged to
suit children attending school, it is hoped

that energetic denomination gave his
services without fee or reward to forward
its principles. He was one of the victims
of the Desjardins Canal Railway calamity
in 1857.

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THE LONDON NOMINATION.

A mass meeting of the Liberals of London
will be held in the Grand Opera House
this (Saturday) evening for the purpose
of nominating a candidate, to represent the
city in the House of Commons.

At last general election, through cause
now well known, and that need not be
specified, but which will be avoided in the
ensuing contest, Mr. C. S. Hyman, a
Liberal candidate was defeated by a ma-
jority of only 39.

On this occasion the Liberals are much
stronger, as will be shown as the contest
progresses. They did not believe the en-
agement when it assured the country that
the voters' lists would be revised gain
before the general election. They voted
closely after the revision in the summer of
1889, and the Conservative managers,
ulled into the security by the assurance of
the Government, paid no attention to it.

By this means the Liberals gained from
150 to 200 votes on the revision. But this
is only one of the many advantages which
the Liberals have on the present occasion.

With a good candidate—and there seems
to be no doubt that the nominee will be a
very strong man—and a good cause, Lon-
don should take its proper position as a
progressive, fair-play loving community.

The city should have two members in the
house, but meanwhile the past-stricken
rulers deprive us of our proper representa-
tion before a redistribution of seats on the
basis of population can take place. Our
interests and prestige are nothing to them.
But the Liberals will take good care that
before another general election London
will have her rights in this and in many
other respects.
