Murderer Escaped.

Toronto, Sept. 16.-Albert Wilson, a murderer, who was saved from the Bryan, the Democratic nominee, but gallows on the plea of insanity, succeeded in escaping Saturday from Toronto Asylum, where he has been well concealed. In his latest interview, he expresses the belief that "every State west of the Missouri were in charge of Wilson and other inmates at the time of the escape have been summarily dismissed. Wilson had been keeping company with a young girl in Warwick towngirl attended church with another young man, and Wilson laid in wait for her and deliberately shot her dead church door. The French epicure cares little for the venison steaks and current jerty that the gourmets the other side of the Rhine smack their lips over, and the "tarts" of apple and rhubarb which the Englishman loves have no cult in the United Kingdom. Germans, though their southern boundary is but a few hours' distant from the land of macaroni, abhor that delicacy, without which the true-born

Italian would certainly grow faint and sick at some of the combinations of meats that make the Teuton ruddycheeked and strong.
But these tastes in food are altogether normal, and induced partly by the climate. There seems to be little excuse for earth eating, however, which is a custom of scores of savage and even civilized peoples all over the world. One of the most remarkable recent examples of this abnormal appetite is furnished by a seemingly epidemic which broke out

among the children of the city of Cavins, a town in the province of Queensland, Australia. Scores, and hundreds, even, of the children of that place seemed all at become afflicted with a strange disease, which caused great emaciation of the body, and a swelling of the abdomen. 


