TORONTO, Dec. 4-11 p.m.--High pressure with moderately low temperature extends from Manitoba to Quebec. In the Maritime Provinces pressure is low with cloudy weather and local snow falls. In the northwest it is fair with temperature above zero and a tendency to higher pressure and lower temperatures.

Minimum and maximum temperatures: Victoria, 32°-40°; Nain, 8°-18°; Edmonton, 4° below-14°; Prince Albert, 22° below-2°; Winnipeg, 14° below-24°; Port Arthur, 4°-42°; Toronto, 28°-32°; Kingston, 26°-30°; Montreal, 26°-30°; Quebec, 18°-26°; Halifax, 34°-40°.
