# Salisbury Rebuked Beef, Iron and W

in Lancashire.

The Seat Held by Secretary Curzon Captured.

The Press Considered It a Censure of Lord Salisbury's Chinese Policy.

300 Lives Lost by the Flooding of a Coal Mine in Silesia.

The Queen of Denmark Seriously Ill-Proposal to Divide Up Samoa-Spain's Queen Regent Calls the Cortes for Sept. 5.

MARKED LIBERAL VICTORY. London, Aug. 25 .- The election for the seat in the House of Commons for the Southport division of Lancashire, S. W., made vacant by the acceptance

by Mr. George N. Curzon of the viceroyalty of India, was held yesterday, and resulted in the return of Sir Herbert Naylor-Leyland (Liberal) by a majority of 272 votes over his Conservative opponent, Lord Skelmersdale.

The polling was: Sir Herbert Naylor-Leyland (Liberal), 5,100; Lord Skelmersdale (Conservative), 4,828; Liberal majority, 272. At the last election for the seat, Mr. Curzon, in the Conservative interest, was returned by a ma-

jority of 764. The result of the election is a bad defeat for the government, Mr. Curzon having held the seat since 1886. Peculiar circumstances affected the contest. A section of the Liberal-Unionists. headed by the chairman of the local Unionist Association, declined to support Lord Skelmersdale, on the ground that now that the home rule agitation is dead, there is no longer any need for Liberals to vote for Conservatives. Thereupon Mr. Chamberlain, secretary of state for the colonies, plunged into the fray with a letter urging the Unionists to vote solidly for Lord Skelmersdale because home rule was not dead, but only sieeping. The Unionist leaders professed to feel contempt for this "little Unionist revolt," the success of which is likely to have important results as

regards the relations of the parties in he future. All the papers agree that Lord Skelmersdale's defeat is an expression of the electors' dissatisfaction with Lord Salisbury's Chinese policy. The Daily Chronicle and Daily News declare that it sounds the knell of the Conservative

Lord Beresford goes to investigate the prospects of commerce and to report particularly as to the extent to which the Chinese Government will guarantee the safety of British capital already invested and of contemplated investments. He will prob-

ably be absent several months. CORTES TO MEET SEPT. 5. Madrid, Aug. 25 .- The queen regent has signed the royal decree convoking

the cortes for Sept. 5. THE QUEEN OF DENMARK It is reported at Copenhagen that the condition of the Queen of Den-mark has become worse, and that her daughter, the dowager czarina, has postponed her departure.

PLACE FOR A PRINCE. The Manchester Courier says that the lord lieutenancy of Ireland is likely next year to be made a non-political and permanent office, which will probably be occupied by a member of the royal family, possibly the Duke of Connaught.

TWO THOUSAND MINERS ON STRIKE.

Madrid, Aug. 25 .- At the San Quintin mine, in the Province of Ciudad Real, Spain, 2,000 miners have gone on strike. Forty gendarmes have been ordered there to prevent trouble. It is believed the differences will be speedily arranged.

SENTENCED TO TEN YEARS. Gibraltar, Aug. 25. - Owen Collan, the soldier who shot and bludgeoned Mr. Hubert Birkin at the Bristol Hotel, Tangier, Morocco, a couple of months ago, after Birkin had insured his life for \$50,000, and had made a will leaving Collan \$25,000, has been found guilty of intent to murder and sentenced to ten years' penal servitude.

DIMEMBER SAMOA Berlin, Aug. 25 .- The Marine Politische Correspondez, which created a sensation some time ago by advocating an anti-American attitude in the Philippines, now draws attention to America's acquisition of Pago Pago, and proposes that the Samoan Islands be divided between Germany, England and America. London, Aug. 25.—A dispatch to the Standard from Madrid, by way of France, says: A very unfavorable im-pression has been caused in Madrid by telegrams attributing to President Mc-Kinley the intention of instructing the peace commissioners to insist upon the cession of Luzon, that American commerce should have the same footing as Spanish in the Philippines, and that Spain should pledge itself that none of the Spanish colonies should be ceded to European powers. If such are the intentions of the United States Government the negotiations are sure to be laborious, even if an understanding is ever reached. The Spaniards consider the cession of Luzon, their best and most important island, to be a death blow to their prestige and sovereignty

in those regions. THE SULTAN OF MOROCCO. A dispatch to the Herald from Tangier, Morocco, says: In order to check the rumors of the sultan's death, it is reported that he is leaving Marrakesh for Fez, there to receive the embassies' official visits, returning after the Sus rising has been quelled. There is absolutely no definite news concerning the sultan, and the public mind is undecid-

ed whether he is dead or alive. The grand vizier of Morocco is alarmed at the increasing influence of Germany, and at the Italian demands, and is preparing to dispatch a Moorish embassy to Europe, probably London and Rome, to settle outstanding claims and arrange for a fresh basis of agree-

MAPKID FEELS ANXIOUS. London, Aug. 24.-The 'Times' Madrid correspondent says: "The recent articles in the Times, recommending the annexation of the Philippines by America, are attracting much attention here. They are regarded as confirming current rumors about a secret agreement between the cabinets Lendon and Washington for joint action in the far East. In any case, it is feared that the rapprochement, which unquestionably exists, contains the germs of great international com-

Madrid, Aug. 25 .- El Liberal, in trying to forecast the immediate future, says: "Two contingencies are possible. says: "Two contingencies are possible. Either the great powers will come to an agreement about their respective spheres of influence, or there will be a great war, in which England will would lose the Philippines, because they would be included in the partition. In the latter case England would begin by an attempt to get possession of the keys to the Mediterranean, including Ceuta and the Balearic Isles, which may be regarded as the keyhole. This possibility of a struggle for naval supremacy in the Mediterranean at some time in the near future gives certain importance to reports of new forts in the vicinity of Gibraltar and diplomatic correspondence thereanent. Neither Spain nor England, however, can be supposed to have any aggressive designs, and if we read between the lines of certain very guarded semi-official statements we must conclude that the Spanish Government has recently received from London some positive assurances on this point. Spain must, it is said, maintain her elementary rights to natal self-defense. but she has at present sufficient diplomatic difficulties on hand to prevent her creating additional complications.'
