CHARLES HARRIS DEAD.

FRESH OUTBREAK IN CRETE.

A special from Constantinople says:

The ambassadors here on Monday re-

ceived news of fresh disturbances hav-

ing broken out in Crete, during which

a notable Greek was assassinated, and

that these troubles have reached Rhe-

tymio. A second telegram has reached

the ambassadors, saying that the re-

volutionary movement had also de-

clared itself at Canea, and that com-

plete anarchy reigned everywhere.

MORE COERCION TALK.

Paris, Feb. 4.—The Temps, in an ar-

ticle believed to be inspired, an-

nounces that the foreign diplomats at

Constantinople, acting in complete ac-

cord, have decided to demand of the

Turkish government that they agree

upon potential coercive measures, the

justification of which by the cabinets

of their governments they are await-

ing. When this shall have been ob-

tained, the reforms will at once be

presented to the Sultan.

BOUSING LIBERAL VICTORY.

London, Feb. 4.—The election to fill

the seat in the House of Commons for

the Walthamstow division of Essex,

made vacant by the appointment to

a judgeship of Edmund Widdington

Byrne, Conservative, was held yester-

day, resulting in the return of Mr.

Woods, Liberal, who received 5,133

votes, against 4,233 for Mr. Dewar,

the Conservative candidate.

At the last general election the Con-

servative majority was 2,353.

HONORS FOR NANSEN.

London, Feb. 4.—Dr. Nansen, the Arctic

explorer, accompanied by Mrs. Nan-

sen, arrived here yesterday. They

were met at Victoria Railroad station

by Sir George Baden-Powell, at whose

house they are staying, and other

scientists. The crowd about the divi-

sionary was cheering the travelers.

Sir George Baden-Powell gave a dinner

and a reception in honor of the Nor-

wegian explorer. It is understood that

Cambridge University will confer an

honorary degree upon Dr. Nansen.

MR. BAYARD'S DINNER.

London, Feb. 4.—United States Am-

bassador, Bayard, gave a dinner in

honor of the Prince of Wales last ev-

ening at his residence, 83 Eaton square.

The occurrences of the official dinner

of the Special of the House of Com-

mons prevented the Ministers and

members of the House of Commons

from attending Mr. Bayard's banquet.

His Royal Highness, attended by Gen.

Clark, arrived in a two-horse brough-

am at 3:30 p.m. Yesterday, Mr. Bay-

ard sat at the head of the table, with

the Prince of Wales, who was in a

most genial mood, upon his right, and

Lord Salisbury on his left. The only

decorations of the dining-room and

hall were made by azulejos and tiles

of the valley. The dinner was served

at 10 o'clock. Mr. Bayard did not

make his appearance during the eve-

ning. A banquet was given by the

toast to Queen Victoria, and the Prince

of Wales proposed the health of Presi-

dent Cleveland, speaking in generous

terms of America's chief magistrate.

Canadian Views on International Questions to be Fairly Placed Before

Representative Men.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 4.—Sir

Richard Cartwright, of Ottawa, and

H. L. Davies, Canadian Minister of

Marine and Fisheries, will arrive in

this city today, where they are to

meet leading political men to discuss

the tariff, alien labor law and other

matters affecting the interests of

Canada and the United States. It is

understood that these gentlemen come

not as formal representatives of the

Canadian Government, with an ex-

pectation of negotiating a treaty or

settling the alien labor law, but solely

for the purpose of having an informal

talk with representative men in Wash-

ington on matters affecting the inter-

ests of both countries. It has been

contended that Canada's case has

never been laid fairly before the United

States, and certainly never have

any representations been made of

what concessions Canada would offer

if the United States would meet her

half way. Both the Canadian and

United States Governments may be

said to be starting on a new era. Both

are new from the people, and as a

member of Congress here said today:

"It is well, if possible, that we should

know each other's views as affecting

mutual interests in starting out, if

a friendly chat will secure it." It

is to that end that the present in-

formal visit to Washington by the

Canadian Ministers is made. They

will be received in the same spirit in

which they come.
