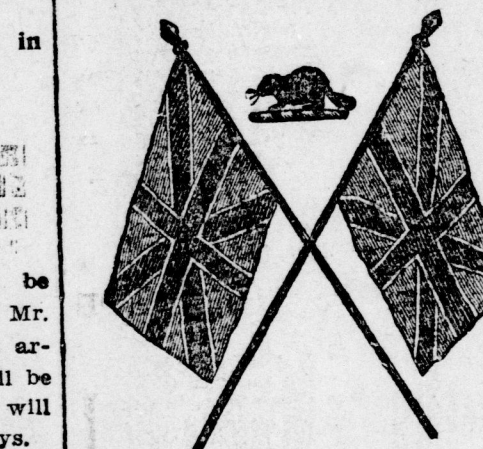

WINDSOR'S EMBEZZLER

Sent for Four Years to Kingston—He Breaks Down.

Windsor, Ont., June 8.—Charles Reid, the defaulting clerk of the water board, appeared before Judge Horne in the County Court Saturday and pleaded guilty to embezzling \$6,000. The judge, after commenting upon the enormity of the offense, said the prisoner had rendered himself liable to a sentence of fourteen years in the penitentiary, but in view of the circumstances, he would be as lenient as possible, and let him off with four years. Reid looked as if he would faint, and it was with difficulty that he grasped. "Can't you make it less than that?" The judge, who had known him since he was a clerk, replied, "If the money had been mine, I would have had the right to forgive, and you could have walked out free, but the interests of the public must be considered." Reid broke down, and when he was led out, begged the sheriff to have him removed to Kingston at once. He will probably be taken there Monday. He has a widowed mother, a wife and several children.
