
### SAD ACCIDENT AT ST. THOMAS

Largely Monopolize the Attention of Old London.

The Queen's New \$2,500,000 Yacht U suitable for Her Majesty's Use-The Composer of "Annie Laurie."

[Special Cable Letter.] London, March 17 .- Everyone hears expressions of satisfaction that while the answer to the American offer of mediation was clothed in words of perfect courtesy, the language of Lord Salisbury in declining President Mc-Kinley's proffer was so extremely definite as to kill all possibility of a repetition of the offers from any source, unless those proposing them are desirous of being recognized as openly antagonistic to this country. Emphasis is laid on the fact that Great Britain had declared at the outset her unwillingness to consent to any outside interference, and, therefore, as the right of intervention is conditional on the willingness of both parties to the quarrel to accept the good offices of a mediating power, such interference was in this case outside the bounds of diplomatic possibilities, and gave Lord Salisbury full justification for his "retort

TRELAND AND THE SHAMROCK. Outside the high international politics, Ireland and the shamrock largely monopolize the attention of London. The internecine strife in the Nationalstic ranks engendered by Dublin corporation's address to the Queen, and the bitterness felt in loyalist circles in Ire-and at the outward exhibitions of disrespect of her majesty, keep the officials guessing as to what is likely to occur at the Irish capital next month. THE QUEEN'S NEW YACHT. The new yacht built for the Queen in the government dockyards at a cost of about \$2,500,000 will probably never be used by her majesty. Her instability, so palpably demonstrated at the time of her undocking, has caused the Queen to take a strong dislike to the vessel, and the alterations necessary so materially reduced her comfort and convenience that it is believed they will render the vessel unsuitable for the purpose originally intended. The probability is that the yacht will ultimately be renamed "Enchantress," and converted into a dispatch vessel for the use of the admiralty.

THE AUTHOR OF "ANNIE LAURIE."

A quaint, venerable lady, who might, to all appearances, have just stepped out of a Goldsmith comedy or a Gainsborough picture, died this week In the person of Lady John Scott Spottiswoode, the composer of "Annie Laurie," and other familiar melodies. She was 91 years of age, aunt of the Duke of Buirleugh, and closely related to the late Gen. Wauchope. She had a very strong character, and was a great upholder of old manners and When traveling she rode in a carriage, and always had postillions, She was a liberal benefactor of the poor, and maintained a meal mill as a relic of old times, and she preferred thatches on roofs and peat for fires. ### CABLEGRAMS.

Venezuelan Arbitration Has So Far Cost Britain \$328,125.

Secretary Long has cabled instructions to Admiral Watson at Cavite, to send a United States warship to Taku, China, at the mouth of the Tcho River, to look after American missionary interests that are threatened.

As an outcome of the recent riotous demonstration again the British consulate at Bordeaux, when the windows of the consulate and the consul's resiwere shattered by stones, the three ringleaders of the mob-two stu-dents and a clerk-were sentenced to short terms of imprisonment and fines and to pay costs of the prosecution. President Ingelisias of Costa Rica has issued a proclamation suspending the constitution of the republic, and declaring himself dictator until after the threatened invasion on the Mora shall occur or be abandoned. The constitution has now been suspended for two weeks. Costa Rica and Nicarague are quiet.

A mass meeting, summoned last evening to denounce the act of the Dublin corporation in voting an address to the Queen, was almost a fizzle.

There was no disorder.

It is again reported—but discredited in Berlin-that Germany will soon acquire a coaling station at El Kreit, on the Persian Gulf, and also additional

territory in China. The Shanghai correspondent of the London Times says: Concurrently with the representations of the American association to Washington against the anti-foreign policy of the empress dowager, the China association has suggested to the British minister that a remonstrance against the action of the Chinese Government would be consistent with British policy.

At a meeting in the Mansion House, Dublin, the lord mayor presiding, a committee was appointed to fittingly receive the Queen, and \$7,000 was sub-scribed for decorations.

In the House of Commons the parliamentary secretary for the foreign office, Mr. Broderick, said the British expenses in the case of the Venezuela arbitration from 1895 to date had been \$328.125. He added that there was no suggestion that British Guiana should defray any part of the expense. CABLE NOTES.

### THE COLD DIP

Proves Fatal to a Couple of Fruit Tree Agents-Freezing Weather in the Sunny South.

Newark, N. J., March 17.—James Saunders and Ezra Cummings, Chicago fruit tree agents, froze to death in yesterday's heavy storm near Liberty Corners. Extremely heavy snowfalls are reported in the District of Co-lumbia, Wisconsin, New York, Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama. Atlanta, Ga., March 17.—Freezing temperature was reported yesterday as far south as a line running east and west through the center of the cotton belt. Killing frost is reported at Fort Smith, Ark., near Mobile, and at Macon. Fruit men say the trees can-not stand a continuation of cold. The recent warm weather had considerably

advanced the trees. New York, March 17.—A dispatch from Utica says: Reports received from the hunting and fishing pre-serves in Northern New York state that the recent storm has caused many deaths in the game life in that section. Snow is said to be seven feet on the level, and is causing the deer much difficulty in securing food. From Lewis county it is reported that deer have been found completely exhaust-ed, that many have died, and many more will perish in the cold for lack of food. Hunters say the numbers now endangered will surpass even

those of last winter. Chicago, March 17.—The temperature this morning beat all records for this late in March since 1888. At 2 o'clock this morning the thermometer registered one below zero. The cold wave which originated in the Northwest, had its center in this district. Chi-cago, Milwaukee and Green Bay were the only places where the tempera-ture reached zero.

SIGNS OF A LET-UP. According to the predictions of the weather bureau there is no warm wave in sight, but the temperature will moderate today.


