Little Girl Terribly Mangled at Allandale.

Toronto Doctor Killed by a C. P. R. Train—Farmer Crushed to Death by a Falling Tree.

TERRIBLY MANGLED. Barrie, Ont., April 11.-A fatal accident occurred at Graham's Crossing, Ailandale, yesterday afternoon. A little daughter of Mrs. Aldrich, who was playing there, was run over by a freight train and lost both arms and both legs below the knee. She died at the Barrie Hospital this morning.

DOCTOR KILLED. Toronto, April 11 .- Dr. J. Archer Watson, a well-known surgeon, re-siding at 149 Sherbourne street, was instantly killed today at the C. P. R. on Dundas street, near crossing Lambton Mills. Dr. Watson was riding a rather restive horse, which beof the C. P. R. express. The doctor got it across the track, but it began to back, and as the express reached the crossing it was right across the track. The doctor and the horse were instantly killed. No blame is attached to the men in charge of the train.

FATAL EXPLOSION. West Branch, Mich., April 12.—The boiler of Ed. Arnold's saw mill at Rose city, exploded with terrible results. One man was instantly killed and another seriously injured. The boiler was huried a distance of 200 feet, and the entire mill is a wreck.

BADLY BURNED. Utica, N. Y., April 12.-Mrs. H. L. Kelsey, of this city, was fatally burned yesterday. She was burning some old papers in the garden, and the wind blew the flames against her skirts. Before the fire was put out her clothing was nearly all burned from her body, and it is said she cannot live.

KILLED BY FALLING TREE. Manila, Ont., April 12.-While trying to free a tree that had lodged in another, John Ferguson, a highly respected farmer, who lived on the 2nd concession of Mariposa, was instantly killed. The tree, although very small, crushed his skull and made a terrible

A BARGE WITH SEVEN CARS Nelson, B. C., April 11.-The C. P. R. sustained a loss of over \$10,000 yester-day on Kootenay Lake, between Kootenay Landing and Nelson. A car barge, carrying 15 cars, in tow of the tug Valhalla, sprang a leak and went down by the head, precipitating seven cars of coal and coke into the lake. The tug towed the barge with the balance of the cargo to the shore, where it now fies partly submerged. It is not known whether several tramps, who were

stealing rides from Fernie went down with the cars or not. The lake is about 400 feet deep where the accident oc-Six cars have been recovered, and it is expected that the balance of them with their contents will be also recovered. The barge will be in service again in a few days.

London, April 11.-Much attention is being given by the press to the new system of taxation which the chancellor of the exchequor, Hicks-Beach, may find it expedient to recommend in the budget speech, if he succeeds in pulling himself together for a courageous effort, to throw down the gauntlet to Sir William Vernon Har-The Mail has been advocating a tariff virtually of the protective order for several months, and its pro-tests against unlimited and unreasoning direct taxation have been even more strongly accentuated since the return of Alfred Harmsworth from America. The Times anonymous correspondent, to whom were accorded honors of large type, with a sympathetic leader, writes like another Robert Giffen in his mastery of financial controversy and the science of economics. This gun practice is not continuous, but every long range shot is deliberately aimed at graduated income taxes and progressive death duties as the sole resources of the treasury in an imperial crisis.

At the sessions of the anti-alcoholic congress in Vienna, many of the delegates justified moderate drinking, and a stormy scene ensued. Strong at-tacks were made upon the medical profession for encouraging the use of alcohol, and there were mutual recriminations between the medical and nonmedical elements of the congress and between the moderates and the total abstainers. It was unanimously agreed on the evidence of statistics, that de-lerium tremens is curable. An equally unanimous opinion was recorded that every dose of alcohol administered to children is poisonous. 
