

APPOINTMENTS THE PRESIDENT AT HOME MISSION

Made by the Methodist Board to Stood the Journey Well and Is Cover the West. Free From Pain.

Four New Superintendents-One to Will Stay in Temporary White House Look After New Ontario.

Brandon, Man., Sept. 24 .- The General Board of Methodist Missions last night formed four superintendencies of missions and appointed local superintendents as follows:

No. 1-New Ontario, including Al goma, Sudbury and Nipissing districts, Rev. James Allen, M. A., of Sault Ste. Marie, superintendent. to reside at Sault Ste Marie after conferonce of 1903.

No. 2-Manitoba, extending from Manitoba to Battleford, Rev. Oliver Darwin, superintendent, to reside at Moosejaw.

No. 3 - Alberta, comprising the balance of Manitoba and Northwest Conference, Rev. T. C. Buchanan, superintendent, to reside at Edmon

No. 4-British Columbia, comprising East Kootenay, West Kootenay, and Kamloops districts, and such other parts of British Columbia Conference as may be designated; Rev. Jas. H. White, superintendent, to reside at Nelson.

Rev. Dr. Wordsworth is appointed corresponding secretary for the Manitoba and British Columbia Conferences.

It was agreed to withdraw one of the three missionaries now in the Yukon. A committee of five Northwest members of the mission board, was appointed to confer with an Anglican Church committee respecting Indian missions and schools.

Owing to the condition of Rev. Dr Hart's health and the disturbed state of affairs in China it was decided to extend Dr. Hart's furlough another year.

Rev. Dr. Benson raised the question of how it was that white miscionaries required \$1,200 to \$1,300 per annum, while \$300 per year was conmdered ample for native teachers. The matter was referred for further investigation.

Rev. James Allen, the new superintendent of missions in New Ontario, is at present president of the Toronto Conference.

Upper Canada College.

Toronto, Sept. 25.-The governors of Upper Canada College have been making the necessary arrangements so that Dr. Parkin may be able to leave to take up his new work in connection with Rhodes' scholarships with as little disturbance to the college as possible. The governors have provided that when Dr. Parkin leaves Toronto, J. B. Sparling, the well-known senior master of the school, shall, under the title of acting principal, have the authority and perform the duties of a fast Fr principal, and Mr. Somerville, as head sell it. master in residence, shall have exclusive charge of the college residence. The choice of a successor to Dr. Parkin as principal is occupying the attention of the governors, and it is expected that the new principal will selected before the end of the present year.


