**TWO TRUE BILLS
AGAINST CHANTLER**

The Trial of the Butcher, How-
ever, Is Postponed—Another
Case Laid Over.

The grand jury yesterday, at the
general sessions before Judge Elliott,
brought in two true bills against Fran-
cis Chantler, on charges of receiving
stolen cattle. The trial was, on the
request of Mr. Ed Meredith, K. C.,
counsel for defense, postponed until
the December sessions, as one of the
principal witnesses for the defense
could not be secured.

Another criminal case postponed was
that in which T. T. McCarthy was
charged with the theft of colts at Port
William. The prosecutor was a man
named Howard, McCarthy's former
employer. Howard is absent from the
city and the trial cannot be gone on
with.

The only case disposed of yesterday
was that in which John and Alexander
McFarlane sued D. H. Gilles & Co.
for \$200 damages. The defendants were
requested to have cut down a grove of
maple trees, the property of the plain-
tiffs. The jury gave a verdict of \$100
for the plaintiffs.
Eric Ericson a Swede, applied for
naturalization papers.

All Arrangements Completed for

Tomorrow.

Tomorrow the annual picnic of the

Lorton streets, 11:30; West London,
11:30; Quebec, Dundas and Quebec
streets, 11:30; King street, York and
Ridout streets, 11:30; Colborne south,
Clarence and Horton, 11:30.
