NOW FOR THE BATTLE

Arrangements Completed for Maneuvers of Seventh Regiment.

Full arrangements for the field maneuvers of the Seventh Regiment at Springbank tomorrow have been completed. A general outline of the sham battle has been drawn up, but, while keeping in mind the general idea, each party will, of course, be free to move as will.

The general idea of the battle is: An eastern force, consisting of Companies A, E and H, having occupied London, has a portion of its force protecting the water supply at Springbank. A western force, consisting of Companies B, C, D, F and G, is trying to cut off the water supply.

The western force will assemble at the armories at 8:30 o'clock in the morning and march to Byron Bridge, whence it will begin its attack at 10:30. The eastern force will leave the armories at 9:30, and proceed to Reservoir Hill, remaining east of the pump-house, and will then move on to the water supply.

Thirty rounds of blank ammunition will be used. The western force will advance within 500 yards, an advance scout of the eastern force will fire. The western force will then be notified by a messenger of the western force, and he will use his ingenuity in trying to dislodge the eastern force.

When officers or men allow a superior force of the enemy, not less than two to one, to get within 100 yards of them, they will be considered out of action, and must proceed to the rear of their force, the men carrying rifles with the butt end over the shoulder.

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FLAMES DESTROY EAST END HOME

John Melmer, Frances Street, the Loser—Firemen Did Not Have Enough Hose.

The residence of John Melmer, on Frances street, East London, was destroyed by a fire which broke out about 1 o'clock this morning. The firemen, who arrived promptly to the alarm, but when No. 2 company arrived they found that the nearest hydrant was over 1,500 feet from the house, and that there was not enough hose on the wagon to reach the blaze. DEATH OF OLD WM. SNELL

Doctors Say Injuries Inflicted by Producers Could Not Cause It.

"That the deceased William Snell came to his death at Victoria Hospital on the 18th inst., from natural causes," was the verdict handed out last night by the coroner's jury acting in the case. Both the doctors who gave testimony said that the injuries inflicted by Alfred Producers, who was convicted of assaulting Snell, could not possibly have caused the latter's death.

Dr. Hogg said that death was due to stomach trouble and found no evidence of external violence except unimportant bruises on the head. Dr. Wilson said that if external violence had caused the internal trouble, the latter would have developed in less than six days. Dr. Wilson asked Snell if the assault had caused the trouble and Snell had replied in the negative.

Evidence was also given by Mrs. Ellen Snell, deceased's wife, by Mrs. George Producers, and by William Reid. William Reid said he was at the house of William Snell two weeks ago Sunday morning when Producers assaulted Snell. Witness was sleeping upstairs, and came down about 7 o'clock Sunday morning when he heard an altercation going on. Producers had a bag of cakes and Snell cried "They are mine," striking Producers at the same time. Producers said, "If it were not for the law of the land, I would massacre you on the spot." Producers then kicked Snell, and the latter cried to his wife, "Nellie, they are killing me." Snell afterwards called a policeman, and Producers went away quietly.
