After This It Will Be Merely a Commons Back to Business Matter of Decapitation -No More Branding.

New York, April 25. - A Pekin dispatch to the Herald says that in response to a memorial of Mr. Wu Ting Fang, formerly Chinese minister to the United States, an imperial edict on Monday abolishes the punishment of slicing to death and substitutes immediate decapitation.

The exposure of the heads and bod-

FLEETS ARE TO MEET

British and French Sailors Will Fraternize in the Mediterranean.

London, April 24. - The extremely interesting situation created by the events at present occupying the attention of European statesmen, forms the subject of earnest discussion at the embassies.
