TO SWEAR IN MAGISTRATES

Commission for Middlesex County
Appointed by Ontario Government

The Whitney Government has made
the first move toward the appointment
of its friends to positions as magis-
trates in the county of Middlesex.
A commission, consisting of his Honor
Judge Talbot Macbeth, Crown At-
torney McKillop and Registrar John Wat-
ers, of Middlesex, has been appointed
to swear in the new magistrates, as
well as any of the old ones who escape
the axe.

A general commission of the peace
for Middlesex has not been appointed
since 1863, and all the justices of the
peace who have been appointed since
that time were known as associate mag-
istrates. But now, with a new com-
mission, magistrates for the entire
county will be appointed.

MUSIC AND DRAMA

**BLANCHE WALSH IN "THE WOM-
AN IN THE CASE."**

Blanche Walsh, America's greatest
emotional and tragic actress, with a
series of triumphs in the Sardon
dramas and her recent brilliant per-
formance of the heroine of Tolstoy's
"Resurrection" to her credit, comes to
the Grand on Tuesday evening next,
appearing in Clyde Fitch's much-
talked-of "The Woman in the Case," un-
iversally acknowledged to be the best
play from the pen of this brilliant
young dramatist since "The Climbers."

went through the stage as a child, and
continued until he reached his
majority. Then he began preparing

vard a few years later; after four
years' course he graduated with the
degree of Bachelor of Arts. Then he
returned to the stage again. He is a
handsome young fellow, bright, vig-
orous, strong and self-reliant. Light,
healthy, clean-cut, the humorous lines
seem just such as should fall
from his lips, while the mild decent to
which he is party in the play is of the
kind that would appeal to almost any
fun-loving citizen.

Miss Goodrich, his co-star, is very
pretty, has a smooth and sweet voice
and is bright and intelligent. The
Model she is a most attractive and
handsome figure.
The play tells a new story and tells
it well and humorously. This has been

DEATH OF JOHN LEECH

One of Western Ontario's Pioneer
Dairymen Dies at Winnipeg.

John Leech, of Brandon, Man., died
at the general hospital, Winnipeg, Oct.
31, aged 80 years. Mr. Leech was re-
ceiving the X-ray treatment for can-
cer. He was the father of Mrs. (Rev.)
F. J. Oaten, Belmont. Locating in
Brandon with the driving of the first
tent stake pins, he had been ever since
actively associated with the commer-
cial and religious interests of that city.
He was one of the pioneer operators in
the cheese industry of Eastern and
Western Ontario. In politics he was a
lifelong Conservative and in religion a
Methodist.

Mr. Leech is survived by six chil-
dren—Albert, Dominion lands inspec-
tor; Dr. George and Adine of Bran-
don; John and Ernest T. of Winnipeg;
Osten, Belmont; and Mrs. F. J.
Oaten, Belmont. His wife predeceased
him by eighteen months.

WHILE NOT ADMITTING LIABILITY, CITY WILL OFFER A SETTLEMENT

Thousand Dollars to Be Paid
Mr. Reid—A Breakwater
Difficulty.

Without admitting any liability
whatever in the matter, the board of
works last night decided to recom-
mend that the city should offer a set-
tlement to Mr. W. J. Reid, owner of Recumseh
Park. Mr. Reid claims damages from
the city for raising the breakwater on
the east side of the baseball grounds
to such an extent that a person can
now see over the fence without diffi-
culty. On the other hand, the city
wishes to strip the park of the break-
water at the park in order that the
dyke can be strengthened, and also a
small piece of land in the southeast
corner of the ball grounds.

Here is the arrangement Mayor
Campbell made with Mr. Reid, subject,
of course, to the approval of the com-
missioners. The city will pay \$1,000
inside the park, and allow Mr. Reid
\$400 for fixing the fence, to the satis-
faction of the engineer.

A Breakwater Difficulty.

A letter from Engineer Graydon called
attention to the fact that Mr. Win-
niet of Front street, refused to allow
him to have earth hauled from his
property in wagons, to be used in con-
nection with the Front street break-
water, although the city is to pay for
that the hauling could be done. Mr.
Winniet now declined to have any-
thing but wheelbarrows used, which
would be too expensive as the land is
some distance from the breakwater.
The work will cost about \$700.

Another letter from the engineer stat-
ed that by the instructions of Mayor
Campbell, he was proceeding with the
graveling of the Hamilton road, from
Rectory to Egerton streets, where the
new railway line was laid. The work
will cost about \$700.

Mayor Campbell explained that the
road was in a very bad state, and as
soon as it had been done, he ordered
the engineer to go ahead with the
graveling.

The committee approved of the
mayor's action.

gravel walk and end of Beacraft
avenue. The walk is to be laid by the
