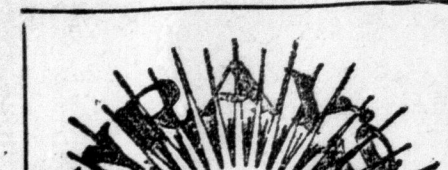

LONDONER RECEIVES WORD OF HIS MOTHER'S SAFETY

Niece of Edward L. Stine Was Studying Grand Opera in Paris.

A telegram was received last night by Edward L. Stine from his brother, Frederick L., in New York city, stating that he had received a cable from his sister, Mrs. Caroline Stine, notifying him of her safe arrival in London from Paris. Mrs. Stine was accompanied by her daughter, Mrs. Louise Schieder, and the latter's daughter, Miss May Schieder.

Mr. Stine, who is manager of the enameling department at the McClary Manufacturing Company, states that no word had reached him of his mother's whereabouts since the opening of the present war, until last night's telegram was received, and that the news of her safe arrival in London along with her daughter and grand-daughter coincided as a distinct relief after the suspense of knowing that they were within the borders of war-ridden Europe.

Studying in Paris.

Mrs. Stine, her daughter and grand-daughter have spent the last eight years in Europe, where, latterly, Mrs. Schieder, for the past three years has been studying grand opera in Paris. Miss Schieder has been conducting her studies under the celebrated singer and teacher, Jean de Reszke. A very successful operatic engagement had just been completed by Miss Schieder in Paris, when the war cloud appeared on the horizon, and she was forced to leave her studies and take passage for London, accompanied by her mother and grandmother.

As soon as possible the party will engage passage for Canada and return to their old home, where they will rest until after the war is settled.
