MAY SELL HOME TO OBTAIN BODY

Chief Moses Caldwell Strives To Raise Money To Transport Dead Son.

Conquest of Pelee Island Far From Thoughts of Walpole Indians.

WALPOLE ISLAND, June 14.—Few members of the Ojibway, Ottawa or Pottawatamie tribes here are disturbing the general tranquility of their lives by thoughts of any conquest of Pelee Island or an invasion there. Their sympathies, though, are turned toward Moses Caldwell, the former chief of the Pottawatamies, whose first-born son, Peter, is lying dead in the Southern United States far from friends or kith and kin. For a week the stricken father has been endeavoring to raise sufficient money to pay for the transportation of the body to the island in order that it may be buried there, according to the traditional ceremonials of the Pottawatamies. Today he is at the Muncie Reserve seeking aid from members of the tribe in that reserve.

This morning his wife declared that it would require a "lot of money" for the transportation of the body, and that if put to it the chief might be prepared to sacrifice his home and cattle on the island here in order that he might have the boy's body lie on land that is Indian, and where he might have an opportunity to visit the grave to observe the ancient rituals of the tribe. There was no preparation for a migration to Point Pelee by any of the Indians at the island, though some of them are strong in the belief that the land in that section is theirs, and it may be with the intention of taking some action of this nature that the Pottawatamies have awarded the chieftainship of the tribe to William Ackwash, a young man. Ackwash was elected in the absence of the old chief from a council meeting.

VETERANS ATTACK PENSION BOARD

President of G. W. V. A. Declares Commissioners "Formulated Secret Regulations."

OTTAWA, June 14.—(By Canadian Press).—Charging the board of pension commissioners with having formulated "secret regulations" on pensions and insurance in direct violation of the intention of parliament, and with "contemptible and cold-blooded conspiracy to deprive ex-service men of rights previously granted by parliament," R. B. Maxwell, G. W. V. A. president, and C. G. MacNeil, Dominion secretary-treasurer, have forwarded telegrams containing their charges to provincial G. W. V. A. organizations, and have lodged a protest before Herbert Marier, chairman of the special parliamentary committee on soldiers' civil re-establishment.

The G. W. V. A. officials declare that the pension commissioners have ruled against the former interpretation of the pension act, under which they state that disability suffered by a man who was sent to France as an A-1 category was attributed to war service. The new regulations, they assert, takes account of disability from which a man may have been suffering and which was aggravated through service at the front, and in spite of the fact that the man was originally sent on service as an A-1 category.

Col. J. T. C. Thompson, chairman of the pensions board, informed of the G. W. V. A. telegram, declared tonight that there had not been a change in policy on the part of the pensions board. He characterized the G. W. V. A. statements as "a mistake and untrue."

TO MAKE BETTING CRIME IN CANADA

OTTAWA, June 14.—(By Canadian Press).—An amendment to the criminal code designed to make the business of betting, bookmaking and pool selling criminal offences, was introduced in the House of Commons at a late hour tonight, when criminal code amendments were under consideration. W. C. Good (Progressive, Brant) introduced the amendment. It was applicable not only to those who actually engaged in betting, bookmaking, pool selling or wagering, but also to persons advertising, printing, exhibiting, selling or supplying any information to anyone engaged in the business of betting, etc., on horse races or other similar events.

Immediately after Mr. Good had moved his amendment, Mr. T. L. Church (Conservative, North Toronto) rose and protested that the amendment was out of order because Mr. Good had a motion on the order paper calling for approximately the same thing.

APPOINTS CRONYN TO COMMISSION

OTTAWA, June 14.—Hume Cronyn, ex-member for London, was appointed by the government today a member of the national scientific commission for scientific and industrial research.

This commission was formed four years ago to investigate business problems and questions of national finance. It consists of eleven experts picked from the whole Dominion.

METIGUE SAILS.
NEW YORK, June 15.—Mike Metigue, middleweight boxer, was a passenger for Paris today on the President Adams. He hopes to arrange a bout that he says has been promised with George Carpenter, light heavyweight champion of the world.

May Wage Cigarette War On Montreal Prices.

MONTREAL, June 14.—The cigarette manufacturers are today engaged in the preliminary skirmish of a new price-cutting war in which the consumer stands to reap the most profit, according to the duration and intensity of the fight. Indications are that all brands of cigarettes now selling at 15 cents per package of ten will drop back to 10 cents.

PRESBYTERIANS TO ASK FOR \$350,000

Will Make General Appeal At Thanksgiving Time.

WINNIPEG, June 14.—A general appeal to the Presbyterian Church for a special offering of \$350,000 will be made at Thanksgiving time to wipe out existing deficits of more than \$300,000 in the budget funds of the church, it was decided today by the Presbyterian General Assembly, during the consideration of the general board's report.

Any action taken by the Presbyterian Church as a body towards church union would be hailed with thankful delight by other religious bodies in Canada, declared Rev. Canon Walter M. Loucks, who headed a Church of England fraternal delegation. The problem was the most pressing before the Church of God, and the whole Christian world was looking forward to it. Isolated attempts to solve the problem would result in disaster.

"If union is consummated we shall be in a position to prove to the whole world that Jesus Christ and His Father are one, and we share in His union," Canon Loucks declared.

The general board had reluctantly curtailed work and refused new and urgent undertakings owing to the large deficit. Dr. R. Laird, D.D., Toronto, secretary of the board, declared. He believed a clear and full presentation in all congregations by voice and printed page of the facts and needs of the board's work would meet with a hearty response from the people, who had wiped out a deficit of \$170,000 in 1916 by a similar special offering.

The budget demands this year were \$1,500,000, the same as last year, but if the church did not unite in getting a larger budget a deficit of probably \$500,000 would be presented to next year's assembly, it was stated by Chairman Dr. D. R. Drummond.

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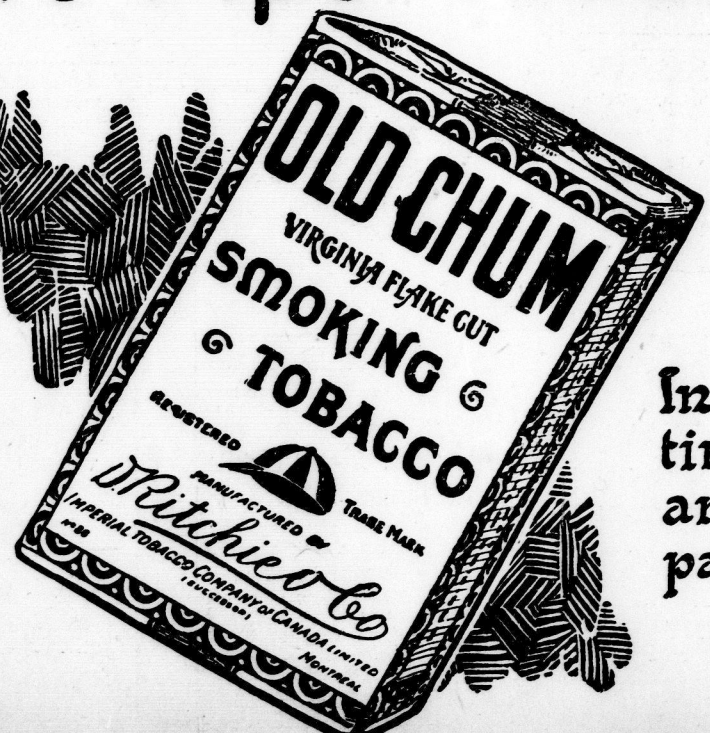
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
